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RUSSIANS TROOPS REPULSE VIO-LENT ATTACK BY THE GERMANS

Violent Fighting on the Somme North of Rancourt

french Machine Gun Fire Checked Attempt of Huns to Debouch---Serbians Make Progress on the Macedonian Front---Bulgarians Forced to Retreat.

PARIS, Oct. 3.—Violent fighting has been in progress on the Somme front north of Rancourt, the War Office announced today. The French curtain of fire and machine guns, however, were effective in checking the German attempts to debouch from the St. Pierre and St. Vaast wood.

The Serbians fighting in the Kaimakcalan region, on the Macedonian front, have made further progress, according to today's official announcement, taking first line trenches from the Bulgarians and capturing another battery. Bulgarian attacks on British positions on the left bank of the Struma were repulsed, the Bulgarians sustaining heavy losses.

SOFIA, Oct, 2, via London, Oct. 3.—A retreat by the Bulgarians under heavy Serbian artillery fire, is reported in an official statement issued by the War Office, referring to the Macedonian front.

The number of Roumanians who have invaded Bulgaria have been placed at several battalions at the Bulgarian War Office. A statement an-itain, Que. nouncing the passage of the Danube by the invaders says:

"On the Danube, near Lianco, between Rustchuk and Turtukai, the enemy conveyed to our banks in boats several battalions. Measures have been taken to attack this force of the enemy."

If the Huns Continue to Send Zeppelins

A French aviation expert, Jacques Marsillac, has examined this machine and his published account after the censors in two countries had made their eliminations, is as follows.

Mounted Patrols Pull off Daring Stunts And Get Away With It---British Line Is Being Pushed Forward---The Roumanians Have Crossed Danube.

With the British Army in France, via London, Oct. 3.—Bapaume is now only two miles beyond the British advance line. Soldiers charging in yesterday's attack speak of their amazement at finding themselves crossing a field of sugar beets. They have at last fought their way out of the desert zone created by the shell fire of two years into a region where peasants have grown their crops, and evacuated their homes only when the battle front drew nearer.

Threaten the Rear of Von Mackensen's Army

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Brief announcements from both Bucharest and Berlin that the Roumanians had crossed the Danube south of their capital and invaded Bulgaria was the only news of this important move in that theatre to reach here last night.

The morning newspapers, however, haid the manoeuvre as dramatic counter stroke against the Bulgarians for the defeat the Roumanians suffered at Hermandstadt. The Times says it hopes the Roumanians did not cross with small forces because the river is wide and the southern bank higher than the northern, so that all disadvantages of position are against the Roumanians.
