ENGLISH GIRL WOULD SACRIFICE AN EYE

Has Offered One of Her optics to a Soldier Who Lost His Eyesight In France.

Paris, Oct. 3.—A young English girl has written to Dr. Rochon DuVigneaud offering to give one of her eyes to a soldier who has lost his while serving France.

The girl, who lives in North Shields, had read a recent statement by Dr. DuVigneaud, one of the foremost oculists in France, that it was possible to save the sight of a man wounded in the eye by grafting a portion of the cornea of another person.

In her letter she said: "If you believe that there is one chance of success in a million, I will give you one of my eyes for a soldier who has lost his sight serving France."

"I would prefer to give my eye to one to whom it would be especially useful, such as an inventor or an officer of great value."

"If my offer is accepted, I shall consider myself under an obligation to you for permitting me to be of use to my country in the only way possible to me."

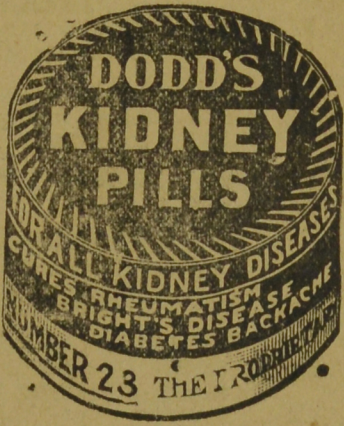
Last evening a meeting was held at the Officers' Mess at which the preliminary arrangements for the Clachan Fair were made.

TRAFFIC REGULATIONS PRESENTED BEFORE COUNCIL

Important Provisions in Proposed New By-law—Will be Considered Tonight.

Ald. McLellan presented a draft of the proposed traffic regulations before the City Council at last night's committee meeting. These are based on the regulations in force in other cities. They affect all vehicular traffic, particularly motor-traffic. Among the proposals are that the Police Commission have control of the enforcement by means of the police force, and that the license fee for a jitney bus be \$25 per year. A speed limit not exceeding 12 miles per hour, on conditions similar to those of the provincial regulations, is proposed; also a speed of six miles per hour turning corners. Ald. McLellan expressed doubt concerning the power of the City Council to fix a speed limit apart from that fixed by the Provincial Legislature.

Nothing was said concerning the dimming of lights. The stopping of cars only along the left-hand curb is provided for. With regard to standing horses, the police are empowered to place blankets on the animals or to place them in livery stables at the expense of the owners.

The new regulations will be up for adoption at tonight's Council meeting.

KILTS NOW SETTLED IN THEIR NEW QUARTERS

Exhibition Building the Quarters For Bulk of Corps—Volunteers Number 157.

The reallocation of the men of the 236th Battalion to quarters was completed last night. The headquarters attached company and details are quartered at the Barracks, Queen Street. A, B, C and D companies went to the Exhibition Buildings last night. At a muster parade the men were told off to their platoons, Acting Sergt. Major Appleby in charge. The men are now all sleeping in the Amusement Hall, which eventually will be the quarters for A company. B company will have quarters on the lower floor. Accommodations for five hundred men are now ready. The building has been sheathed and removable bunks installed.

The steam heating system has also been extended.

While the 236th will be at the Exhibition Building, the entrance to quarters will be by the Smythe street gate. The Saunders street gate has been closed permanently. A new guard-house has been built. About one hundred and eighty men are now on the strength, exclusive of men on recruiting duty and on pass.

Volunteers for the 236th now number 157, after eight days' campaign.

Late Mrs. Thos. Feeney.

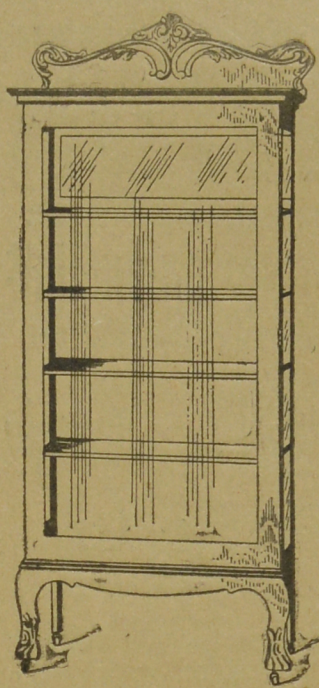
