SUNDAY'S TRIBUTE TO MOTHERS

In view of the fact that Sunday is to be generally observed as Mother's Day, the following extracts from a sermon by Billy Sunday are most appropriate:

The mother knows God so much better than anyone else; it is man who tries to measure God by the tape line of his puny understanding.

She has done her prayerful best and when you have done that you can bank on it that God will not fail you.

If God Almighty struck dead those who haven't prayed today, most of you would drop from your seats right into the sawdust on the floor of this Tabernacle.

God always does things at the right time. Give God a chance; we may be a little slow at times, but He will always get around in time.

Fathers often give up. The old man often goes to boozing, becomes dissipated, takes a dose of poison and commits suicide; but the mother will stand by the home and keep the little band together if she has to manure her finger nails over a washboard to keep the brood out of the poorhouse.

If you want to find greatness, don't go toward the throne; go to the cradle, and the nearer you get to the cradle the nearer to greatness.

When God sends us great men He wants to have them get the right kind of a start. So He sees to it that they get a good mother. Most any old stick will do for a daddy. God is particular about the mothers.

If every mother would rock her own baby the world would be much better. If every mother did as she should or as the Bible taught, the preachers and the police would have little to do.

Talk about greatness! Oh, you wait until you reach the mountains of eternity, then read the mothers' names in God's hall of fame, and see who they have been in this world.

How do you know but that the angels watch your work with as much interest as they watched Moses' mother train that boy?

I tell you, the devil gets in many a boy by getting in his daddy first. Many a boy would have turned out better today if his daddy had died before he was born.

When God gave the office of mother to women, it was just like giving you His own right hand. Think of what importance is attached to it! Think of the mother's power! There is more power in a mother's hand than in a king's sceptre.

You get the boys and girls started right and the devil will hang crope on his door, bank his fires and hell will be "for rent."

There is no power on earth that can lift to Heaven or shove to hell like the touch of a mother's hand.

There is power in a mother's song, too. The best music in the world is like biscuits—it's the kind that mother makes.

Every child is put in a mother's arms as a trust from God, and she has to answer to God for the way she deals with that child.

Don't be afraid, women. God's bank never breaks. The cashier doesn't run away with the money. God pays a good mother a sno one else can pay her.

DEATH AT NASHWAAKSIS.

Mr. John W. Hargrove, father of Capt. Hargrove of the Salvation Army, who was stationed in Fredericton a few years ago but who is now on sick leave, passed away last night at Capt. Hargrove's home, Nashwaaksis, after a brief illness, with erysipelas. He was aged seventy-nine years. Four sons and two daughters survive. AUSTRIAN OFFICIAL REPORT.

BERLIN, May 13 (by wireless to Sayville).—The official Austrian statement of May 12 follows:

"On the Russian front the increased activity of the Volhynian section of the front is being maintained. There were no events of particular importance. On the Italian front artillery combats of varying intensity continue. Attacks by the enemy against Mrzlivher were repulsed. On the Balkan front the situation is unchanged."

BULGARS ON THE MOVE.

LONDON, May 1.—The Odessa correspondent of the Daily Mail telegraphs: "A large movement of Bulgarian troops is in progress, as the result of the situation on the Saloniki front. Bulgaria has withdrawn 36,000 troops from the Romanian-Danube frontier and the Debruge sector. A large number of German and Austrian troops, it is learned, is also moving in the direction of Saloniki."

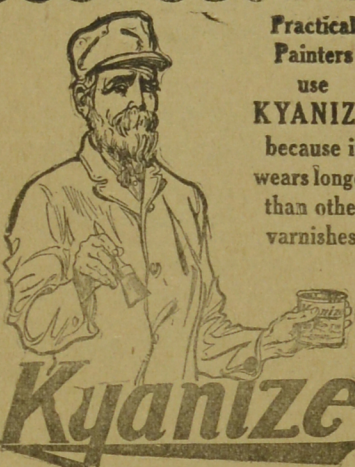

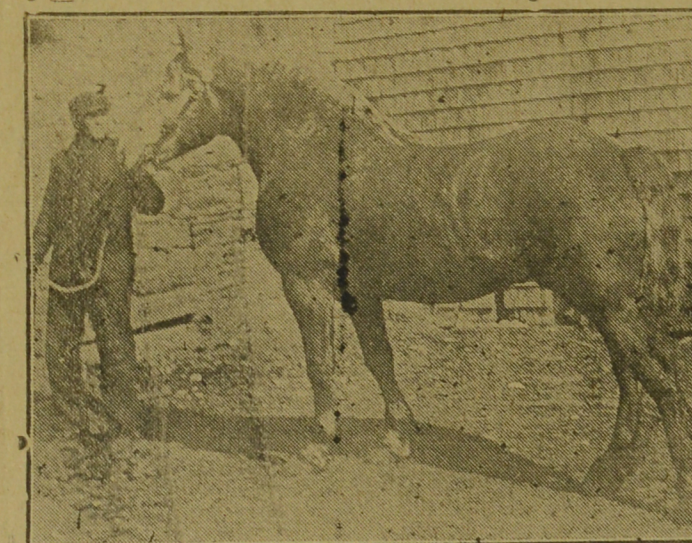
