INFANTILE PARALYSIS

New York, Oct. 6.—A peculiar germ found in small abscesses in the tonsils and adenoids of victims of infantile paralysis has produced an affliction similar to infantile paralysis when in jected into lower animals, according to Dr. E. C. Rosenowe, of the Mayo Foun daiten at Rochester, Minn., who ad dressed a meeting of the New York Academy of Medicine last night. Dr. Rosenow said that experiments had been conducted by himself and other physicians of the Mayo Foundation on rabbits, guinea pigs, monkeys, cats and dogs. He declared marked improve ment was shown in cases of infantile paralysis following the removal of the onsils and adenoids.

He did not, however, advocate the emoval of tonsils in persons afflicted with infantile paralysis as a means of recovery. The number of experinents had been to small to prove anything of value to medical science in his particular connection, he added, out what he considered of importance was the fact that now, for the first time, the disease could be treated pathologically on a much wider plan than nas heretofore been possible.


