**LIEUT. CHAS. E. BLAIR,
RETURNS TO TAKE COM-
MISSION WITH 236TH**

Lieut. P. T. Godenrath Also Reports
Here--Major H. H. McLean, Capt.
E. A. Sturdee and Lieut. H. S.
Everett at St. John

Lieut. Charles E. Blair, of St. Mary's, who is to command the Queens county platoon of the 236th Highlanders, arrived here this morning. He was met at the C. P. R. station by Major Frank Eason, adjutant of the 236th, and one of the pipers of the battalion, and was escorted to the barracks. Later he was taken to his home by his brother, Mr. H. M. Blair, in the motor car of the latter.

Lieut. Blair left Fredericton with the first draft of the 71st York Regiment, joining the 12th Battalion at Valcartier. In England he became battalion quartermaster sergeant of the 12th, and after transferring to the 13th Battalion, Montreal Highlanders, he obtained the same rank. He served in France for several months.

Lieut. Percy T. Godenrath and his wife arrived here this morning. He served in France with the 16th Battalion, Canadian Scottish, holding the rank of sergeant. Mrs. Godenrath was a nurse in France. Lieut. Godenrath is wearing a kilt of Seaforth tartan.

Other officers who are to join the 236th reported at St. John today. They are Major Hugh H. McLean, son of Brigadier General H. H. McLean, who is to be second in command of the 23th; Captain E. A. Sturdee, formerly of Fredericton, and Lieut. Herbert S. Everett. The latter served with the 6th Mounted Rifles, Capt. Sturdee with the 26th Battalion, and Major McLean with the 52nd Battalion.

**SERGT. DRURY ALLEN,
SON OF E. H. ALLEN,
WOUNDED TWICE**

Letter From Capt. R. H. Winslow
States His Wounds Were Slight--
Saw Sergt. Allen When Latter
Received First Wound

Mr. E. H. Allen this morning received an official telegram from Ottawa informing him that his eldest son, Sergt. Drury Allen, had been wounded in France. This is the second wound he has received. The first, on September 15th, was slight. The second was received on September 18th. The nature of this is unknown.

Sergt. Allen enlisted at Edmonton with the 49th Battalion and was made machine gun sergeant. He had been in the west some years.

Capt. R. H. Winslow Writes.

Mr. J. J. F. Winslow has received a letter from his brother, Capt. R. H. Winslow, who was wounded recently. Writing on September 23rd from France, he states that his wounds are slight and that he will rejoin his unit within a week. He was struck by a splinter from a high explosive shell above the left eye. An hour afterward another shell splinter struck him in the back. The letter states that he saw Sergt. Drury Allen shortly after the latter was wounded, and that the injury was in the hand. This evidently refers to Sergt. Allen's first wound.

Capt. Winslow further writes that his cousin, Lieut. Donald B. Winslow, went unscathed through the fight in which the writer had been wounded. He also writes the same of Lieut. "Bun" Beckwith.

Lieut. Winslow has since been reported a casualty.

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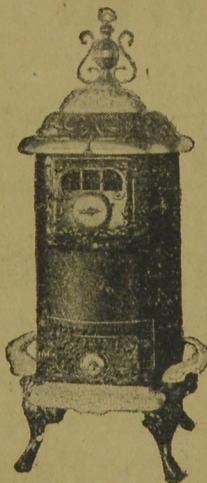
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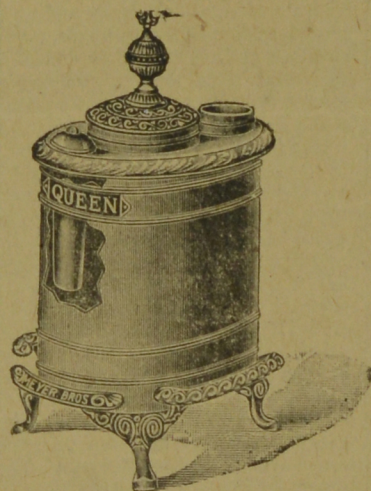
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
