BRINDLE BULL DOG WAS ON FIRING LINE

Quebec, Nov. 1.—An amusing incident connected with the arrival of a party of convalescents here last night, was the appearance of a brindle bull dog, who is back wounded.

The dog was smuggled over the firing line by Private Klentisky, a member of the 40th Battalion, first Canadian contingent. Private Klentisky enlisted at St. John, N.B., and brought his pet dog with him. He cleverly eluded the vigilance of the officers by putting the dog in his kit-bag when leaving England for the front.

The most peculiar part of it was that the pet dog was wounded on the same day as the owner, May 24th last.

FIERCE FIGHTING IN GALICIA.

Austro-Germans Pressing Back Both Russians and Roumanians.

Petrograd, Nov. 1.—Fierce battles between Austro-German forces and Russia ntroops are taking place south of Brzezany, on the Zlota Lipa river, in Galicia, says the Russian official report of today.

In the region of Michiscuv wood, superior Teutonic forces pressed back the Russian troops to the southern portion of the wood.

Austro-German forces have occupied the Roumanian villages of Racovitza and Titechti, about 11 miles south of Aothenthurm Pass, on the Transylvanian frontier.

A LARGE MAJORITY AGAINST CONSCRIPTION

Melbourne, Australia, Nov. 1.—The anti-conscription lead in the balloting on the question of compulsory military service is only slightly reduced in the latest returns, which show the following results: Against conscription, 966,000; for conscription, \$83,000.

It will be a considerable time before the actual result is known. The newspapers are discussing reconciliation between the conscriptionists and the anti-conscriptionists and laborites, but the future depends entirely upon the attitude of Premier Hughes.

The political situation is intense. At Sydney about 20 labor members of the State Departments have withdrawn their support from W. A. Holman, Premier of New South Wales, and formed a new party, while the Minister of Labor and Industry, John Estell, has resigned his portfolio owing to differences over conscription.

At Brisbane Senator Bambord has been expelled from the labor movement because he supported conscription.

THE BELGIANS HELPING THE BEST THEY CAN

Seven Millions Starving Presents a Big Problem Even Though Millions of Dollars are Given.

Recalling the German claim that Belgium is doing nothing for her people—permitting them to starve, the starvation inflicted by the German occupants of the country—a Dutch newspaper shows that up to the end of October, 1915, the Belgian government and Belgians throughout the world, had given nearly \$65,000,000 towards the funds needed for revictualing the people.

Belgium is doing her part—doing all she can and all that she can be expected to do, considering the terrible blow that fell on the nation and the way she stemmed the onrush of the German forces, while Britain prepared.

Thus the Dutch paper explodes the argument of the Germans, but in the meantime the fact remains that Belgium cannot do all and that even with the help of the British government there must be much outside contribution, for no matter how little the food issue to these people, the aggregate is considerable, because there are seven millions of them to be fed.

Seven millions—and the majority of them heroic women and helpless children. Each town, village and city of Belgium today presents a scene of squalor and misery, based on hunger. Mid the ruins of what were once homes—homes as happy as ours—these emaciated women, thinly clad, their faces showing the lines of sorrow, walk, clasping to them tiny kiddies, crying for the food they cannot have.

It seems hard to say food that they cannot have when our tables are laden with so much, so many delicacies, the cost of which would feed one of these Belgian children several days. Think of your children—then think of these others to whom there has been no happiness, nothing but hunger, cold and sickness for two years, and then think that there are seven millions of these starving people.

HOW WOMEN OF B. C. CLEANED UP PROVINCE

The Women's Liberal Association Did Much in the Recent Election Campaign.

When Mrs. Gilbert MacIntyre asked a few people to tea at the Queen's yesterday to meet charming and girlish little Mrs. John Farris, of Vancouver, mother of four, they did not know that they were to hear the inside story of the romantic side of the Women's Liberal Association of Vancouver.

Listening was a bewildering pleasure, as this graduate of Acadia nimbly told the story of the grand western women who, as she said, felt that if B. C. were good enough to have thousands die for it, it must be made politically clean enough for those who came back to live in.

So they organized, prepared for two things, a long, protracted siege or a hurry-up call. The women wanted the suffrage that they might repeal the iniquitous B. C. laws concerning women, child marriage and so on, and Conservative women left their party standard and rallied to the support of the party which promised the emancipation of the sex. They checked the voters' lists before the election, they got out the vote on election day, they spoke at many meetings—Mrs. Ralph Smith, well known in Toronto, being on the platform thirty-five times, Mrs. Farris herself ten.

And because the women were statesmen, with a self-less goal, they outwitted the politicians, whose objective was the reverse, and not a child nor a husband, nor a household duty was forgotten while they planned and worked and triumphed.
