Mr. O'Connor was formerly lecturer on international law at Dalhousie University.

COUNSEL APPLIES FOR DISMISSAL OF CHARGE

Hotel Man Defending Case of Alleged Interference.

The case against the proprietor of the Waverley Hotel, charged with interfering with the police while the latter were executing a search warrant under the Canada Temperance Act, was before the police court this morning. Mr. P. J. Hughes appeared for the defence and Mr. R. B. Hanson for the prosecution. Policemen Jones and Hughes were called as witnesses. The interference alleged consisted of the breaking of two bottles of liquor which had been seized by Policeman Hughes. The evidence given concerned this incident.

Mr. P. J. Hughes, upon the prosecution resting its case, applied for a dismissal of the charge. The grounds which he urged were that it had not been proven that the offence had been committed wilfully, and that it had not been proven that the police were at the hotel legally.

Police Magistrate Limerick adjourned the case.

Suffragettes

On the Rampage

London, Nov. 2.—Two suffragettes were arrested at midnight Tuesday for hurling stones through five of the windows of the Home Office and the Colonial Office in Whitehall. The stones bore such inscriptions as "Down with Grey," "Down with Haldane," and "Roumania must not be sacrificed."

In the Bow street police court the public prosecutor asserted that the raiders acted in violation of the truce declared between the government and the leaders of the suffragette movement for the duration of the war. He said he believed the leaders of the women's movement would frown upon acts of this character.

At the request of counsel for the defendants, the court postponed their cases to a later date.

Three soldiers of the 236th had appeared before him on various charges. At the request of Lieut. Col. Guthrie the men had been handed over to the military authorities. One of those men, on his own statement, was liable to three years' imprisonment. Col. Guthrie had taken the wrong course. He had asked him to explain to those men how serious their offences had been, but instead, supported them against the civil authorities. Colonel Guthrie had claimed that Sergt. Foss was justified in what he had done at the time of the arrest of Private Nichols; yet the evidence showed that it was the interference of Foss that made Nichols resist. Foss' action had made him liable to four years in penitentiary. His Honor stated that he would give a soldier the fairest treatment possible, but it must be understood that the civil police could arrest a soldier.

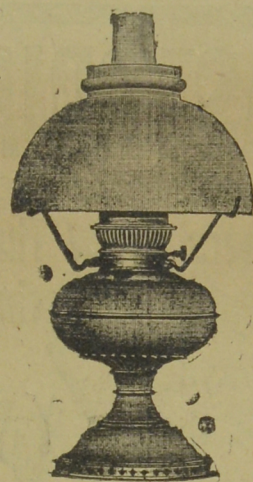
