HEAVY SENTENCE IMPOSED IN CASE OF INTERFERENCE

Sentence Suspended and Sergt. Foss Handed Over to the Military Authorities—Magistrate Made Some Pointed Remarks

Heavy sentences were imposed by Police Magistrate Limerick this morning upon Acting Pioneer Sergt. George Foss, of the 236th Highlanders, for interfering with the civil police when they were arresting a soldier, and for refusing to assist the civil police in making the arrest when called upon to do so. On the first charge he was sentenced to six months in jail, and on the second to two years in penitentiary. Both sentences were allowed to stand, and the accused was handed over to the military authorities.

Many Present.
There were many people in the court room to hear the sentence, as the cases had attracted much public attention. At the request of the magistrate a number of officers of the 236th Highlanders were present. They were Major H. H. McLean, officer commanding in the absence of Lieut. Colonel Guthrie, Major C. R. Mersereau, Major G. S. Ryder, Capt. E. A. Sturdee, Lieut. N. C. McFarlane and Lieut. F. C. Wetmore.

The Magistrate's Remarks.
His Honor drew attention to the impression existing in the minds of certain soldiers that they could not be dealt with by the civil authorities. He wanted all military officers to do what they could to make the men under their command understand that the civil law could deal with them.

MORE LUMBER WILL BE CUT ON NASHWAAK THAN LAST SEASON

Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company Intends to Cut Twenty Million—Will be Manufactured at Union Point.

The Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company, which has taken over the business of the Partington Pulp & Paper Co., is preparing to expand the lumbering operations upon the Nashwaak river during the coming winter. The estimated cut upon Nashwaak lands of the company is 20,000,000 feet.

Last season the cut was only about 16,000,000 feet. This increase of 25 per cent. will mean more wages and larger crews in the woods.

The reason for the increased cut on the Nashwaak is higher prices for pulp and paper. The logs cut on the Nashwaak are all to be used for pulp.

Nothing has developed in the project of building a pulp mill at Marysville, and it is rumored that the Nashwaak Company will continue the methods of their predecessors in manufacturing all their pulp at Union Point, St. John.

There were rumors that the dam in the Nashwaak at Marysville was to be rebuilt, but nothing has been done and at present there is no prospect of it being rebuilt.

Refuse From Mills.

Mr. H. A. Powell, K. C., of St. John, and Senator Gardner, as members of the International Waterways Commission, have completed an investigation of the reports that lumber mills along the St. John river had been dumping refuse into the river. They report that the statements were correct and are taking steps to put an end to the practice.

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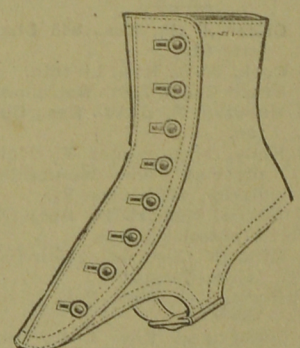
