## CENTRAL POWERS ARE EVERYWHERE ON THE OFFENSIVE

**Situation Very Different From What it Was a Year Ago---Wonderful Tactics of The Russian Army---Austrians Isolated From the Germans in the East---Report That Kovel Has Been Abandoned.**

London, Aug. 1.—The second anniversary of Germany's declaration of war on Russia finds the relative positions of the belligerents very different from the first anniversary. The Entente Allies are now pursuing a successful offensive on all fronts, and the Central Powers are virtually everywhere on the defensive.

Emperor William has celebrated the occasion by the issue of proclamations to his army and navy and people, which breathe a spirit of continued confidence in ultimate victory for Germany.

The operations on the eastern front continue to surpass those in the west in dramatic interest. The military critics express great admiration for the Russian tactics, one of the important objects of which, in their opinion, has been to isolate the Austrians from the German armies on the Russian front. This, it is now claimed, has been virtually accomplished by the Russians driving a wedge into the Austro-German positions along the front of Kovel-Vladimir-Volynski.

The view here is that if the Russians have thus accomplished severance of the Germans from the Austrians, the most decisive result of the whole of the Russian General Brussiloff's strategy will have been obtained, it being argued by the military observers that without German support the Austrian armies will become demoralized and collapse. They say that the Austrian forces commanded by Von Bothmer, between the Lipa and Dniester rivers, are doomed.

Report Kovel and Vladimir-Volynski Abandoned.

There has been no confirmation of reports received in Rome that Kovel

and Vladimir-Volynski have been evacuated, but Rome is unusually well informed on Russian news.

A correspondent with the Russian forces has reported that the roads towards Kovel "are black with the retreating enemy."

Exactly where General Brussiloff's next blow will fall is not known. The Russians are virtually within the same distance of both Kovel and Vladimir-Volynski, and also are pressing closer toward Lember.

Since Sunday's combined advance on the Somme line by the British and French, the situation there has been comparatively quiet. The French have sustained the brunt of the German counter attacks launched against positions captured in this region. The Germans claim to have driven back the British, who had penetrated a narrow front territory west of the Four-chaux wood, and to have successfully repulsed French attacks in the neighborhood of Maurepas.

There has, however, been no important change in the line since the Anglo-French advance.

Russians Hold River Bend.

Petrograd, Aug. 1, via London.—The official communication from headquarters issued this evening says:

"In the region of the villages of Stolsva and Smolary, the German infantry made a rush attack on troops occupying the western bank of the Stokhod river. They were repulsed by our troops, who inflicted heavy losses on the enemy. The battle is still proceeding."

"On the Caucasus front our troops advanced further in the direction of Sivas, to the west of Erzincan."

## MARKET BY-LAW AMENDED LAST NIGHT BY COUNCIL

**Merchants Can Buy in Market at Any Time and Forestalling is no Longer Possible---No Opposition to Ald. Burnett's Motion---Finance Department Will Get After Delinquent Tax-Payers on Expiration of Discount Period.**

The City Council last night rescinded that portion of the city by-laws which prevented merchants from buying produce in the city market before ten o'clock in the morning.

This action does away with the offence of forestalling and places grocers, butchers, etc., on the same footing as the general public.

The by-law was altered on the motion of Ald. Burnett, and all of the eight aldermen present voted for it. It is probable that the general public will protest against the change.

The City Council also endorsed Ald. Reid's move to proceed with the collection of taxes immediately after the expiration of the discount period on Aug. 21st. This is to prevent citizens from holding back their money for private use rather than paying during the discount period.

The members present were Mayor Mitchell, Ald. McLellan, Ald. Reid, Ald. Lemont, Ald. Shea, Ald. Barker, Ald. Burnett, Ald. Everett and Ald. Baxter.

### Municipal Home.

Ald. Baxter, for the Municipal Home, reported a total expenditure of \$384.42 for the month of July, of which \$62.50 was for outside relief. On his motion a cheque for \$175 was ordered to issue in favor of Commissioner Niles.

### Tax Collections.

Ald. Reid reported as follows on tax collections.

July 1915	\$2,436.63
July 1916	4,111.93

For the year 1916 the sum of \$2,920.42 had been collected during the past month. In July 1915 collections for that year had amounted to \$3,398.35.

Ald. Lemont, for the music committee, reported that five open air concerts had been played during July, and on his motion a cheque for \$125 was ordered to issue in favor of Mr. R. H. Wickett, secretary of the Fredericton Brass Band.

### Market By-law Altered.

Ald. Burnett drew attention to subsection 10 of by-law 35, which forbids forestalling in the city market. He said he considered the by-law injurious to at least two-thirds of the people of the city. It bore particularly hard upon grocers. Only a small proportion of the people bought directly in the market. As things stood, the merchants had to take the leavings after ten o'clock.

Ald. Burnett moved a resolution rescinding the by-law after August 1st.

Ald. Everett seconded the motion, saying he agreed fully with Ald. Burnett.

Ald. Lemont said he would support the motion. The abolition of the by-law, he knew, would be unpopular with the people who frequented the market, but nevertheless would be to the advantage of the greater number of citizens.

The motion was carried without a dissenting vote.

### After Arrear Taxes.

Ald. Reid moved that the City Treasurer be instructed to proceed at once with the collection of taxes for 1916 in arrears after August 21st, the last day of the discount period. He explained that many citizens had been in the habit of paying their taxes at their own convenience, claiming that it was more profitable to use the money than to take the discount. The intention was to stop this practice.

The motion was carried.

The Council then adjourned.
