## UNITED STATES AND THE SUBMARINE INCIDENT

American Attitude in Regard to the Belligerents is Shown in a Disagreeable Light.

London, Oct. 18.—The statement by Earl Grey, the Foreign Secretary, to the House of Lords yesterday, regarding the operations of belligerent warships off the coast of the United States, created a considerable stir, says the London correspondent of the Liverpool Post.

"It has thrown a most disagreeable light upon the attitude of the American government in the early stages of the war," the correspondent comments. Washington is shown in a querulous, captious mood, making demands which it admitted were not legally tenable.

"The incident referred to is now ancient history and might well be forgotten, but in view of the extraordinary proceedings in connection with the U-53, members are speaking very bitterly of the behaviour of the American government.

The rumors mentioned by Baron Charles Beresford and Viscount Grey seem to have some foundation, and if they are authentic the Foreign Secretary has been pressed to demand an explanation.

### CHANCE FOR AMERICAN GREEKS.

New Greek Government Wants to Recruit Greeks in America.

London, Oct. 18.—The Greek provisional government has opened negotiations with the United States, says a despatch from Athens to the Exchange Telegraph Co., for the purpose of securing freedom of action in recruiting Greeks in America.

Upon being officially recognized, the provisional government will send representatives to the United States and to Egypt and Cyprus to conduct recruiting campaigns.

Mr. John E. Redmond's motion for a change in the government of Ireland was defeated in the British House of Commons yesterday by a vote of 303 to 106. The speakers, besides Mr. Redmond, included Premier Asquith, Hon. H. E. Duke, Hon. David Lloyd George, Sir John Simon, Mr. J. H. Griffiths and Mr. Joseph Devlin.

### NO COMPULSORY REGISTRATION.

Winnipeg Statement That Government Would Pass Order is Denied.

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—The statement in Winnipeg by E. R. Chapman, one of the divisional directors of national service, that the government would pass an order-in-Council for compulsory registration in Canada, is denied here.

It is said he had no authority for making any such statement.

### JELICOE'S MOTHER DEAD.

Britain's Admiral Has Lost Both Parents Since the War Began.

London, Oct. 18.—Mrs. Jellicoe, the mother of Admiral Sir John Jellicoe, commander of the British Grand Fleet, died last night at the age of 82.

The Admiral also has lost his father since the war broke out, while his father-in-law, Sir Charles Gaynor, died last September.
