YORK COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

Successful Meeting Held at Harvey Station Last Week---Fredericton Men Took a Prominent Part---Some Parishes Slow In Paying Their Allotment---Report on Temperance Creates Some Discussion---Enjoyable Trip to Oromocto Lake.

Harvey Station, July 23.—The annual convention of the York County Sunday School Association was held here on Thursday and Friday. About thirty-five delegates from Fredericton and the different parishes were in attendance. The first session was held in the church at the station on Thursday evening after the arrival of the train from Fredericton. The devotional exercises were led by Rev. J. F. McKay, the pastor of the congregation, after which he welcomed the delegates in a short address. The County President, Mr. W. M. Burns, of Fredericton, then took the chair and addressed the convention, speaking of the aims and objects of the association and the great importance of the work.

Rev. Mr. Sutherland, who is supplying the Presbyterian Church at Fredericton, delivered a very interesting and instructive address on "The Relations of the Sabbath School to the Church."

Mr. A. C. M. Lawson, of Fredericton, spoke of "The Temperance Aspect of Sunday School Work" in his usual effective manner and was much appreciated.

The other sessions of the convention were held in the church at Manners-Sutton. The morning session was chiefly taken up with a conference of County and Parish officers, and the Field Secretary, Rev. W. A. Ross, reports from Department Superintendents, and the report of the Secretary-Treasurer.

Report on Temperance.

There was considerable discussion on the report on temperance which was presented by Mr. A. C. M. Lawson. It was shown that the sale of intoxicating liquor had not been entirely stopped in the county, and the need of temperance training for the young was emphasized. The discussion was participated in by Rev. Mr. Bell, of Prince William, Mr. H. T. Brewer, of Fredericton, Councillor S. B. Hunter and others. Mr. Hunter stated that no intoxicating liquor could be bought in the Parish of Manners-Sutton.

A number of the speaker favored the repeal of the Scott Act and the enactment of a prohibitory law.

The report of the Secretary-Treasurer was not satisfactory. Some of the parishes and the city of Fredericton had paid their allocations for the work of the association, but others had contributed but little. The delinquent parishes were reprimanded somewhat severely by Mr. Lawson.

Training for Teachers.

At the afternoon session Rev. W. A.

Ross spoke of the need of training for Sabbath School teachers and the advantages of a summer school for teachers which has been established by the Provincial Sunday School Association.

Mr. J. W. Spurden, of Fredericton, also spoke very effectively on "The Problems of a Sabbath School Superintendent, and How They May be Met."

Mr. Baird's Address.

Much interest was taken in the address by Mr. Kenneth A. Baird of Fredericton on "The Canadian Boy, a Challenge to Canadian Men." Mr. Baird handled the subject in a masterly manner. He pointed out that where men go, boys will follow, and showed men their responsibility for the actions of the boys. (He referred to the amount of money spent on liquor, tobacco and other forms of self-indulgence as compared with amount spent for religious advancement. He also spoke of the low moral condition of the politics of our country.

At the close of this session luncheon, which had been prepared by a number of the ladies of the congregation, was served in the church, after which the visiting delegates were given an automobile ride to the Oromocto Lake at Tweedside, a distance of about four miles from the church, a number of automobiles having been engaged for the occasion. The trip was somewhat marred by showers which fell during the evening, but was much enjoyed.

Evening Session.

At the evening session Mr. H. T. Brewer, of Fredericton, spoke on "The Qualifications of a Sunday School Teacher," and Rev. W. A. Ross spoke on "The Sunday School as the Church at Work." Mr. W. E. McMullin, of Fredericton, also addressed the convention, his subject being, "How Should I Prepare to Meet My Class?" all of which were listened to with deep interest by a large audience.

Votes of Thanks.

Before closing a vote of thanks to the residents of the community for their hospitality and to the owners of the automobiles who provided the enjoyable trip to Tweedside, was moved by Mr. Lawson and carried unanimously.


