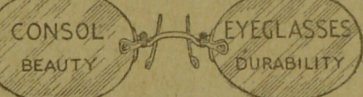
Here From Ottawa.

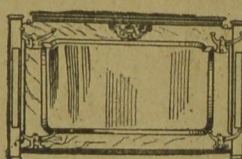
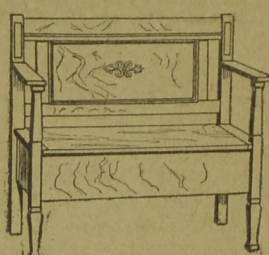
