RESTORATION OF  
PEACE IN TROTTING  
CIRCLES EXPECTED

Conference in New York  
to Settle the Trouble--  
Three Vacancies on the  
Board to be Filled.

New York, May 3.—There are three vacancies in the National Trotting Association's board of review which met here today. Owing to the differences which have arisen in the association, culminating in the election in February, light harness horsemen throughout the east felt an unusual interest in the meeting.

Since the biennial congress held here last winter, H. N. Bain, William Russell, Allan J. O. Winston and R. C. Estilla, representing the Atlantic, Southern and Central districts in the board, have resigned. It was expected their successors would have been chosen in today's meeting.

Since the congress, the Poughkeepsie and Cleveland tracks have been withdrawn from the National Trotting Association. Horsemen look to the board of review to take some action tending toward the restoration of peace in trotting affairs.

IRISH AMERICANS  
WERE SURPRISED

New York, May 4.—According to the morning newspapers here, the speedy action of the English authorities in trying and executing four of the leaders of the Irish republic, was a surprise to Irishmen in this country, who, after the collapse of the movement, hoped some way might be found to save the lives of the leaders.

The fact that the three other signers of the proclamation of the new "Republic" were given only three years was taken to mean that the several hundred Irishmen who took part in the revolution may escape with even lighter sentences.

Following a meeting of leading Irish supporters of the Irish parliamentary party in New York last night, a cablegram was sent to John E. Redmond, M.P., which reads:

"Irish in America, contrasting the execution of Dublin leaders with the treatment in Ulster and South Africa, are revolted by this reversion to savage repression."

It was signed by Capt. Stephen McFarland, president of the New York Council of the United Irish League.

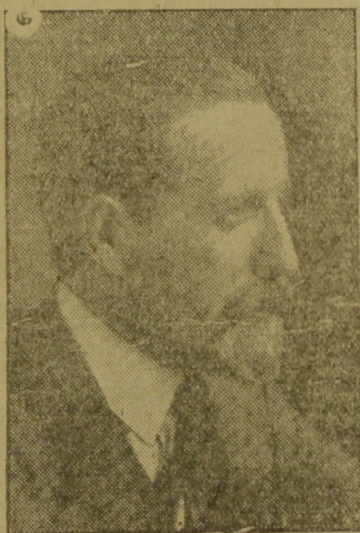

Medal--Track and Field  
Sports May 13.

## Track and Field Sports.

The champion had the fourth round and bested McGuire in the two closing chapters by a shade. Welsh resorted to clinching throughout.

New Bedford, May 3.—Al Shubert had an easy win over Young Wagner of New York in a ten-round bout before the Whaling City A.C. tonight. The fight between Johnny Clinton of New York, and Jimmy Greenwood of this city, ended in the fourth, when Greenwood's foot caught in the ropes and his leg strained so badly that the bout was stopped.

## Martin Knocks Out Lahn.

Providence, May 3.—Terry Martin of this city, stopped Battling Lahn of New York, in the seventh round of their bout at Thornton tonight. Martin floored Lahn twice before putting him out in the seventh.

MISERABLE ATTEMPT  
TO DESTROY IRELAND

New York, May 4.—J. C. Walsh, editor of "Ireland," received a cable message yesterday from John E. Redmond, in which the Irish Nationalist leader reiterated his recent statement that the Dublin insurrection was organized in America as well as in Ireland, by "the irreconcilable enemies of home rule," and begs "our people in America not to be disturbed by this futile and miserable attempt to destroy Ireland," for it has "definitely, finally failed."

The message in part is as follows:

"The attempt to torpedo home rule and the Irish party has failed. Damage has been done, life has been lost, but the ship has not been sunk. The whole thing has been organized by those in Ireland and in America who have always been the open and irreconcilable enemies of home rule and of the Irish party. Though the hand of Germany was in the whole thing, it was not so much sympathy for Germany as hatred of home rule and of us which was at the bottom of the movement. It was even more an attempt to hit us than to hit England."

## A Disgraceful Plot.

"The whole disgraceful plot is viewed with execration by the Irish people. It was almost entirely a Dublin movement, partly the creation of the Sinn Féin cranks and German agents there, partly of the remnants of that mass of discontent and anarchy which was left by the disastrous Larkinite strike."

In a few small towns there were attempts at disturbances, which were easily suppressed, but Ireland as a whole has remained perfectly tranquil. "As to the opinion of the Irish race, I have received communications from all parts of the world declaring vehement condemnation by Irishmen of this insane and wicked attempt to destroy all Ireland's hopes just at the moment when, after centuries of vain struggle, they were about to be fully realized. I beg our people in America not to be unduly disturbed by this futile and miserable attempt to destroy Ireland. It has failed—definitely, finally failed."

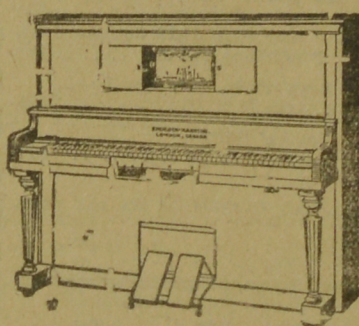
