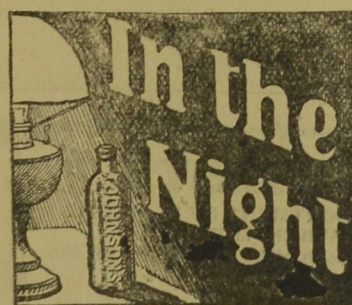
The Government already has plenty of information on the subject—four reports—but it prefers to go on investigating. People got clamorous the other day and insisted on something being done, so the Government ordered another investigation, and let it go at that. They asked for bread and they got an order-in-council.

A Delightful Subterfuge.

This order-in-council is a delightful subterfuge. It is the acme of circumlocution and circumlocution. It proves that the longest way round is the shortest way home. It involves four investigations—and makes no promises at that.

First the municipal council investigates and reports, then the provincial government investigates the municipal council's report and reports; then the Minister of Labor investigates the provincial government's report, and reports to the cabinet council, which presumably investigates whether the people who were suffering from the high cost of living have died in the meantime. If they haven't, the Attorney General may be given permission to prosecute if he sees fit. Thus the thing works in a circle—the snake with its tail in its mouth—the symbol of eternity.

Not to put too fine a point on it, the government's latest move is another bluff, another contractory manoeuvre. Good word that, "contractory." Would look well stuffed. It means "stringing it along."

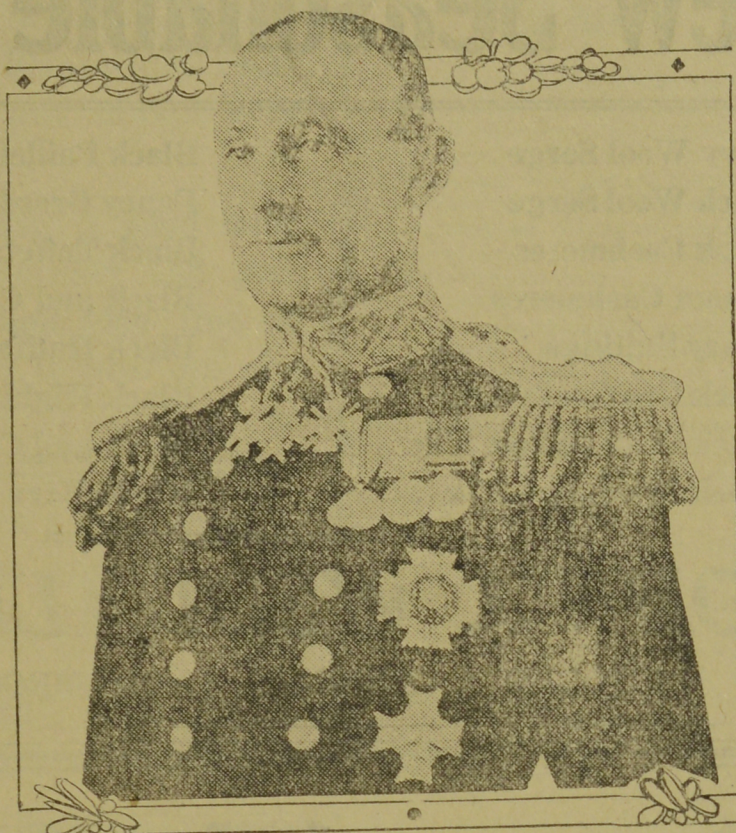

ADMIRAL JELICO HAS BEEN APPOINTED SEA LORD

London, Nov. 29.—Admiral Sir John Jellicoe, commander of the British fleet, was today appointed First Sea Lord of the Admiralty, being succeeded in command of the Grand Fleet by Vice Admiral Sir David Beatty, who commanded the British battle cruiser squadron in the Jutland naval battle.

In being appointed First Sea Lord, Admiral Jellicoe succeeds Admiral Sir Henry Bradwardine Jackson, who had held that post in the Admiralty since May, 1915, when he took the place vacated by Lord Fisher.

Admiral Sir Henry B. Jackson has been appointed President of the Naval College at Greenwich. The announcement of the change in command of the British Grand Fleet was made this afternoon in the House of Commons by Hon. A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty. Mr. Balfour said there would be consequent changes also in the Board of the Admiralty. The decision in regard to the appointments of Admirals Jellicoe, Beatty and Jackson was taken some time ago, Mr. Balfour said, but for military reasons the announcement was delayed.

BOY HURLS 1,000 STONES; 'OH GEE!'

"All In," He Says, When He Winds Up Task—Was Sentenced by Court for Injuring Playmates.

Lynn, Mass., Nov. 24.—Leonard Crowder, ten years old, is nursing a sore arm today. Every now and then he applies some liniment, but gosh! how it hurts at that.

"Yes," he said today. "I've thrown the last stone. I'm sorry I ever threw a stone, and no more for men. Oh, gee! but I'm tired and lame."

He threw the 1,000 stones yesterday afternoon that he was ordered to by Judge Lummus as a penalty for injuring two playmates by throwing stones. The judge gave him two days in which to expiate his offence, but Leonard did it all up in one afternoon.

The first stones that he hurled were large and he tossed them with speed and control. But when he reached the 900's they became hardly more than large pieces of gravel and they travelled almost anywhere.

A probation officer superintended the performing of the penalty and a large crowd of Crowder's youthful friends gathered to see the throwing and yelled encouragement to him. It took just an hour and a half for the boy to complete the job.

In order to carry out the directions of the court that the stones be actually thrown and not merely tossed, the officer designated a rock 27 feet from the firing line to be aimed at. A can was placed on the rock as a bullseye, and Crowder hit the rock only three times and the can not once.

"This is a pretty tough job, after all," the boy said, pausing a minute to catch his breath and rest after firing the first 25 stones.

For the most part he used an under-hand motion. He did, however, try to hit the tin can at 25 yards by winding up and using a pitcher's motion, but hardly came within striking distance of it once in thirteen tries.

"I can't hit it," he pleaded, "I'm so tired. Haven't I thrown pretty nearly enough? I've learned my lesson now. I'll never throw another stone."

But the officer kept him at the task in spite of the boy's tears. As the officer tallied 925 the boy cried out: "I'm all in. I can't throw any more." But his young friends called to him to keep it up and he threw the rest at ten minute intervals. Then he was hurried home, to the liniment bottle.

"I do not believe in sending boys or girls to jail unless the offence is very grave," said Judge Lummus. He expressed satisfaction that the sentence had been performed fully.

CANADIAN AIRMEN TOOK PART IN RAID

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—Several Canadian airmen, one of them an Ottawa boy, took part recently in a spectacular flight from Saloniki to Bucharest. In the event of the fall of the latter city their position may now be perilous, owing to the advance of the enemy.
