OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

IN THE LAUNDRY.

Javelle water will be found useful in removing rust stains. After wetting the stains with this solution rinse in clear water and hang in the sun or if a grass plot is available this will do the work much better. Lay the article on the grass in the sun and keep it wet with the javelle water. If the stain has not disappeared when dry, repeat the process.

Another method is to boil the fabric, if the article be pure white, put a heaping tablespoon of cream of tartar to every gallon of water. The stains under this treatment will grow gradually fainter and fainter and finally vanish.

Tub silks should be put into lukewarm soapy water and rubbed between the hands. Use three lukewarm rinsing waters, hang in the air until dry and iron without further dampening with a piece of muslin placed against the wrong side of the material next to the iron.

White articles of apparel that have turned yellow and grimy

with age or disuse, can be bleached with boiling water, to which has been added a tablespoonful of cream of tartar. "Souise" the goods well in this solution and rinse thoroughly.

TO KEEP QUILTS CLEAN.

Careful housekeepers all wish to keep quilts or eiderdown comfortable clean at the top where they rub against the faces of children. Take a strip of cloth sixteen inches wide, turned over the quilt, so that eight inches will be on each side, and you will find that it is an excellent protector, much better than to depend on the movable sheet.

It may be of linen or fine cotton, made either with a hem one inch wide all around, stitched on the machine or hem-stitched, or the outer edge that is intended for the outside of the quilt, may be scalloped or hand-embroidered. The appearance of the three strips is of the sheet turned over, and there is little work attached to ripping them off when they are soiled and require washing. They save many cleansing bills.

THE DEPORTATION OF BELGIANS.

United States Ambassador Will Make a Firm Protest.

Washington, Nov. 29.—Representations to be made to Germany by the United States on the deportation of the Belgian civilians was a topic of discussion at a conference arranged for today between President Wilson and Ambassador Gerard, who will sail Tuesday to resume his post at Berlin.

The administration has determined to express to the German government its apprehension over the movement of the Belgians in more positive form than by the inquiry which the United States charge at Berlin recently made, on instructions from Washington.

FIREMEN AT THE FRONT.

The Fredericton Fire Department is to send a Christmas gift to each one of the nine men at the front who enlisted while members of the Department.

As the total membership of the Department is only thirty-eight, it will be seen that almost 25 per cent. are serving in the army. The gift is to take the form of tobacco and cigarettes for each man in the largest quantity permitted by the regulations.

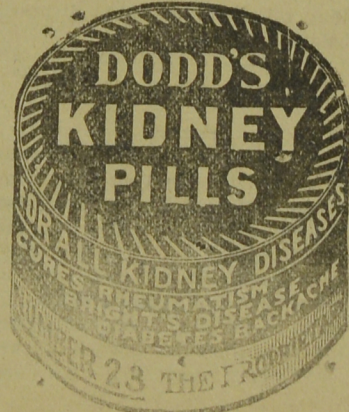

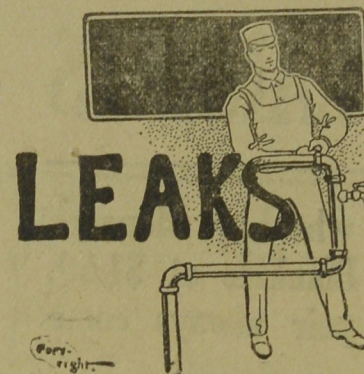
