

SCHEME FOR SETTLEMENT OF NEW BRUNSWICK LANDS

Important Bill Introduced in the Legislature by Hon. J. A. Murray--Ready Made Farms to be Provided for Settlers at the Close of the War.

The House met on Wednesday at three o'clock.

Mr. Munro submitted the report of the Municipalities Committee.

The House went into committee and agreed to the bills relating to the Bathurst Lumber Company, Ltd., and the Town of Bathurst, and to incorporate the New Brunswick Institute of Chartered Accountants, the latter with some amendments.

On the Order of the Day being called, Hon. Dr. Landry moved that supply be made the order of the day for Monday.

The House again went into committee, Mr. Munro in the chair, and agreed to the bills to amend the Act regarding the survey and exportation of lumber and respecting the manufacture of spruce and other pulpwood cut on Crown Lands.

The House again went into committee, Mr. Humphrey in the chair, and took up the further consideration of the bill relating to the St. Croix Power Company, and agreed to the same with a provision that the annual charge to be paid by the company for the use of the water power should be twenty-five cents per constant horse power.

The House again went into committee, Mr. Munro in the chair, and took up the consideration of a bill respecting juries.

Concerning Juries.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said that the law relating to juries generally needed considerable improvement and he hoped next session, after consultation with the Barristers' Society and perhaps some of the sheriffs, to be able to introduce a new jury act. The jury system needed development in order to make it more efficient and also a good deal of the time now wasted. There had been, as hon. gentlemen were doubtless well aware, many requests and representations in favor of an increase in the pay allowed to jurors, and while no doubt it would be very gratifying to the gentlemen who filled that position, it must not be overlooked that it would be paying for a good deal that was at present wasted. Doubtless it would be felt that even if the time was wasted from a legal standpoint, those who were wasting it should be entitled to be compensated for the time they thus lost, but having wait-

ed so long for an increase he thought they might not unreasonably be asked to wait a little longer.

The bill was agreed to, as also was the bill respecting the office of sheriff the daylight saving bill and the bill to amend the Municipalities Act, the latter with an amended title, "An Act to Authorize the City and County of St. John to make certain bylaws and regulations."

Land Settlement.

Hon. Mr. Murray introduced a bill to provide for the settlement of lands after the war. In doing so he said that hon. members were probably well aware that for some time past there had been a very wide movement set on foot looking to preparations for the return of the men who were now serving the Empire in the war, and others who might wish to find new homes overseas when the war was over. It was thought that there would be a great influx of both these classes of citizens into the country and Canadians were looking forward with anxiety and hope towards the future in this regard. It was felt that this country would fill up with these men and it was necessary that preparations should be made to receive them. In order to give every proper consideration to this important question, and get the different views of prominent men who would be likely to be able to advise on this matter, he had invited some of the leading men from various parts of the province to a conference in this city, which was held a few weeks ago, at which His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was in the chair. The discussion which took place on that occasion was very wide and comprehensive, and covered a considerable range of ground and the conclusion came to was that it would be desirable to commence to make preparations without further delay. He had the shorthand minutes of the meeting available, if any hon. gentleman would care to see them and read them over. The bill which he was now introducing recites that it will be advisable to provide a system of settling the large influx of population which was expected after the war and provides that the Farm Settlement Board shall carry out the scheme which has been devised for dealing with the

matter under the direction of an Advisory Board, to consist of gentlemen to be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council and who would act in an honorary capacity. The Board would be empowered to purchase such lands within the province as would be suitable for the purpose in view and also to acquire such private lands as might be found necessary. For this purpose the government should have power to borrow such sums of money as might be required upon such terms and conditions as might be deemed advisable. The lands, when acquired, were to be sold or leased or otherwise disposed of to the settlers on easy terms. The Board would have authority to build houses on the lands and provide the settlers with such farming implements as were deemed necessary.

The idea was not an original one with the government, as it had already been adopted in several other countries, the C.P.R. also having had a similar system in operation for some time, which had proven highly satisfactory.

Hon. Mr. Murray then read the report of an interview given out by Lord Shaughnessy, setting out the respective details of the plan.

The speaker devoted a lot of attention to criticism of the Farm Settlement Board and claimed that there was no justification for the same. He said that the bill did not limit the number of persons who would constitute the Advisory Settlement Board, but said they would receive directions from the Governor-in-Council. He promised that politics would not be allowed to take precedence in its work.

The House adjourned at 5.15 o'clock.

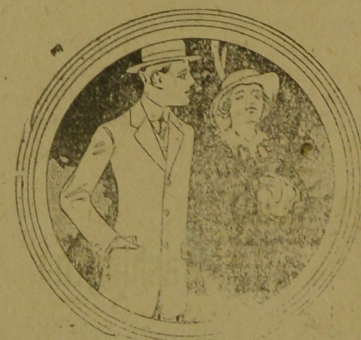
