Advisory Board, to consist of gen tlemen to be appointed by the Lieu tenant-Governor-in-Council and who would act in an honorary capacity The Board burchase such lands within the province as would be suitable for the purpose in view and also to acquire such private lands as might be found necessary. For this purpose the gov ernment should have power to borrow such sums of money as might be required upon such terms and conditions as might be deemed advisable. The lands, when acquired, were to be sold or leased or otherwise disposed of to the settlers on easy terms. The Board would have authority to build nents as were deemed necessary.
