BREAKING AND ENTERING REPORTED AT THREE PLACES

F. L. Cooper's Office Entered and Safe Opened Last Night---A. B. Kitchen's Harness Shop Broken Into Last Night-- No Money Taken in Either Case
E. T. Langille's Bicycle Store Robbed Monday Night---Money Taken From Drawer.

Three serious burglaries have occurred in the city during the present week. All have been reported to the police and are being followed up by them. Last night the office of Mr. Frank L. Cooper at Cooper's Carriage Factory, 364 King street, was entered and the safe opened. The burglar or burglars were interrupted by the entrance of Mr. Cooper. No money was secured by them. Some time between ten o'clock last night and 6.30 this morning Mr. A. B. Kitchen's harness shop, 343 Queen street, was entered and the office ransacked. No money was secured here either. Monday night, Langille's cycle shop, 345 Queen street, right beside Kitchen's harness shop, was broken into. About eighteen or twenty dollars were taken from the cash drawer from the sum of forty or forty-five dollars which were there. The police have been working on this case which was kept quiet, but today it became generally known that the break had occurred.

At Cooper's Factory.

At 8.45 last night Mr. F. L. Cooper went to his factory, entering by the front door. After entering he heard scuffling sounds in the rear, evidently made by some one leaving the building. He entered the office, which is on the left of the main door and observed the window blind had been drawn down. He switched on the electric lamp and noticed that a door leading into a rear office was ajar. He at once thought the thief was there and as there was no other entrance to the rear office thought he had the man trapped. He called the police by telephone and got in touch with Chief McCollom at his residence. The chief at once went to the factory. Much to the surprise of Mr. Cooper the rear office contained no burglar, the man who was operating in the front office evidently having been warned of the approach of the owner and got out the way he came in.

Safe Opened.

An examination of the office safe revealed the fact that the burglar had opened it, only the night bolt holding it, and had forced open several wooden drawers inside. Papers from the safe were scattered all over

the floor. A steel drawer in one corner of the safe had resisted the burglar's efforts but the lock was so damaged that it cannot be opened by Mr. Cooper. The tools which had been used on the safe were hammers and chisels from the work-shop of the factory. Some are missing today. The wooden drawers of the safe were considerably marked but no money was secured. A soldier's swagger stick was left in the office by the burglar but it is doubtful if this is a clue as a soldier bent on safe-cracking would hardly carry his stick with him.

Mr. Cooper believes that at least two men were concerned in the attempt. The yard of the factory was full of wagons and a man could easily hide there and warn his companion inside of the approach of anyone.

Kitchen's Harness Shop.

The entrance to Kitchen's harness shop was effected by raising a rear window of the work-shop. Entrance to the office was effected by forcing a window from the main shop. Papers were thrown about and the place ransacked but no money was secured. The thief or thieves overlooked three dollars and some odd change lying on top of the desk. It is not known whether or not any harness was stolen as it is difficult to tell if any of the stock is missing.

Police Sergt. William Duncan, who lives over the shop, was notified when the break was discovered this morning and the police are now working on the case.

Langille's Cycle Shop.

At Langille's cycle shop Monday night entrance was made by forcing a rear window. The thief took eighteen or twenty dollars from the cash drawer, leaving more than that in the drawer. This act evidently was to mystify the owner of the shop and the police. Mr. Langille was away from the city on Monday but on his return informed the police.

Acquainted With Premises.

In all three breaks it is noticeable that those concerned were acquainted with the lay-out of the premises and also with the customs of the occupants.

DR. D. R. MOORE TO REMOVE TO NEWCASTLE

Dr. D. R. Moore of Stanley, is removing to Newcastle, where he will practise his profession and look after the operative work in connection with the splendid new hospital presented to the town by Mr. Ernest Hutchinson. The doctor is a skillful surgeon and only recently completed a course at the New York Post Graduate Hospital. The Newcastle Hospital, which is now nearing completion, at a cost of over \$60,000, is said to be the most up-to-date institution of the kind in the Maritime Provinces.

Dr. Moore's departure to another field of labor will mean a great loss to the County of York and will be sincerely regretted by all classes of citizens. The doctor is a native of Galt, Ont., but came to New Brunswick with his parents forty-eight years ago. He studied medicine at Harvard University, Bellevue College and the University of Vermont, graduating from the latter institution thirty-five years ago with the degree of M.D. He has since resided at Stanley, where he enjoyed a large practise, extending to three parishes. For years he has conducted a small private hospital at Stanley, where he has successfully treated many difficult surgical cases.

Dr. Moore has been a useful man for the Parish of Stanley in more ways than one. He built the first telephone line on the Nashwaak twenty years ago and connected it with the New Brunswick system at Fredericton. He organized the York & Carleton Railway Company, fifteen years ago and built the Stanley Branch Railway from Cross Creek to Ryan's Brook, a distance of ten miles. For this road he secured a subsidy of \$2,500 from the local government and one of \$3,200 from the federal government, a total of \$5,700. He has operated and managed the road and given the people a satisfactory, all-the-year-round service.

Dr. Moore is arranging to remove to Newcastle next week. His extensive practise is being looked after by Dr. Schwartz of Halifax.

Will Be Tried On Murder Charge

London, April 20.—John McKenzie, a wealthy Glencoe farmer, whose crippled 20-year-old daughter died recently in childbirth, after accusing her father, was today sent up for trial on a charge of murder.

Four other girls have been taken by the authorities for safe-keeping, as their mother is dead. The police declare they have the strongest possible case against McKenzie.

THE AMERICAN NOTE HAS REACHED BERLIN

Berlin, April 20 (via London).—The American note to Germany arrived in Berlin late yesterday afternoon.

Ambassador Gerard probably will present it to the foreign office early this afternoon.

THE PROHIBITION BILL.

It is said that one of the clauses gives the Governor-in-Council power to fix the percentage of alcohol in beer. It is now said that the measure may become effective on May 1.

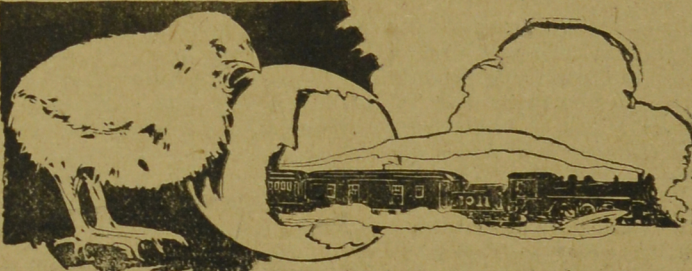

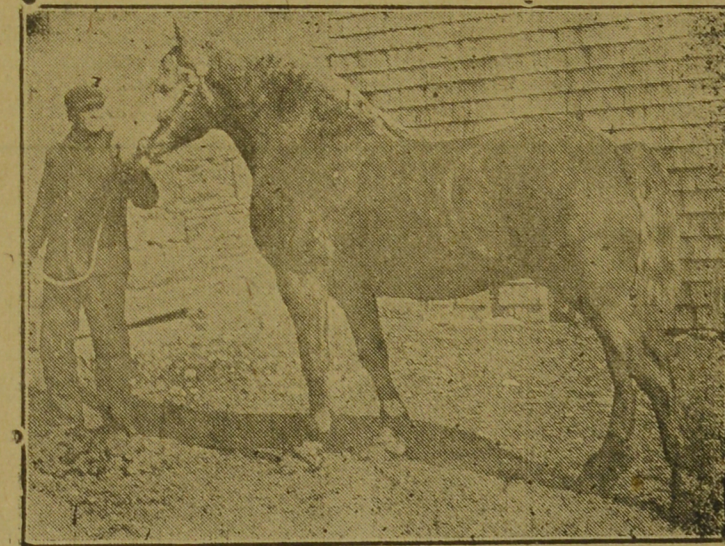
