CAN SOLEMNIZE MARRIAGE.

Rev. J. F. Polley, minister of St. James Presbyterian church, Farrisboro, N.S., has been registered to solemnize marriage in New Brunswick "during the time he shall be a temporary resident of the province."

SAILING VESSEL ARRIVES.

The tern schooner Charles C. Lister arrived here last evening with a cargo of American Anthracite coal for Mr. R. T. Baird. She is now discharging at Mr. Baird's wharf below Court House Slip. The Lister is the first sailing vessel to arrive here this season.

WANTS FORTY RECRUITS.

The Composite Battery, which has been stationed at Partridge Island since the outbreak of the war, has been converted into No. 7 Seige Battery and is calling for forty recruits. Capt. P. E. Roseborn, formerly of Fredericton, is with this unit. It is expected that it will go overseas at some future date.

Being a lady of keen intelligence and having access to newspaper files, she was a recognized authority on events of long ago. The deceased for many years made her home with Mr. William Lemont but when he broke up housekeeping, she went to board with Mr. Estey. A brother of the deceased, the late Mr. Thomas Hogg, editor of The Reporter, was accidentally shot while hunting some years ago. And J. M. Lemont and Mrs. A. C. Fred Chestnut of this city, are nephew and niece of the deceased, and Miss Besse Thompson of St. John, is also a niece. The funeral will take place at 2.30 p.m. on Friday with service by Rev. Thomas Marshall.

ATTORNEY GENERAL
ASKS FOR COFFER
RE CITY COURT JUDGE

Dispute Concerning Salary of That Official Reaches Another Stage--
Special Committee Appointed by City Council Has Not Acted

The matter of the salary of the judge of the City Court, which is in dispute between His Honor and the City Council, has been taken up by the Attorney General and it is reported that the latter has asked His Worship Mayor Mitchell that a conference be arranged with the special committee appointed by the City Council at Tuesday night's meeting, to obtain information concerning the accounts of the City Court. It is expected that such conference will be attended by the Attorney General, Hon. Mr. Baxter, and by His Honor Judge Limerick.

Judge Limerick waited upon the Attorney General yesterday and presented his side of the case. It is understood that the other members of the government also have had their attention directed to the matter. The suggestion of the Attorney General with regard to a conference is understood to have resulted from the representations of Judge Limerick.

As police magistrate, Judge Limerick has a salary of \$500 per year. As judge of the City Court he had a salary of \$1,000 per year. At Tuesday night's meeting of the City Council that salary was not fixed, and a suggestion that it be placed at the former figure of \$700 was made. No action was taken but a special committee was appointed to take up the matter. Falling off in the revenue of the City Court is the reason for the suggested reduction.

COLD WEATHER
IS KEEPING WATER
DOWN IN STREAM

Big Run of Old Logs From Above Grand Falls--Booms in St. John River Now Ready to Receive Lumber

The weather is remaining too cold to cause any marked rise in the water in the St. John River or its tributaries. On the Nashwaak the water has not risen in several days and in the main river the rise is very slow. At present the water is slightly more than eight feet above the winter level.

Mr. Walter Jackson, boom manager of the St. John River Log Driving Company, stated today that there had been a considerable run of old logs, mainly coming from above Grand Falls. The booms of the company now are ready for the logs.

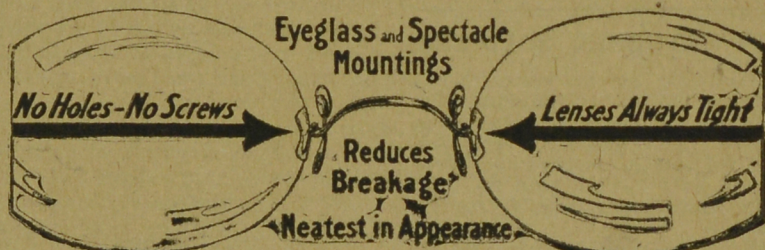
On the Nashwaak and other streams the cold weather is giving excellent opportunity to get the logs off the landings. After that is done, warm weather will be wanted to bring the streams up to driving pitch. No direct word has been received from the crew of the Partington Pulp & Paper Company on the headwaters of the Nashwaak but it is understood that good progress is being made.

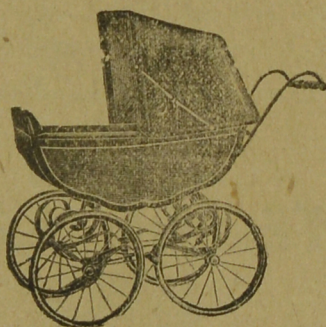
Edmonton, Alberta, April 20.—James Ward, born in Alberta, and reputed to be in his 108th year, is dead at his homestead at Paul de Metes.

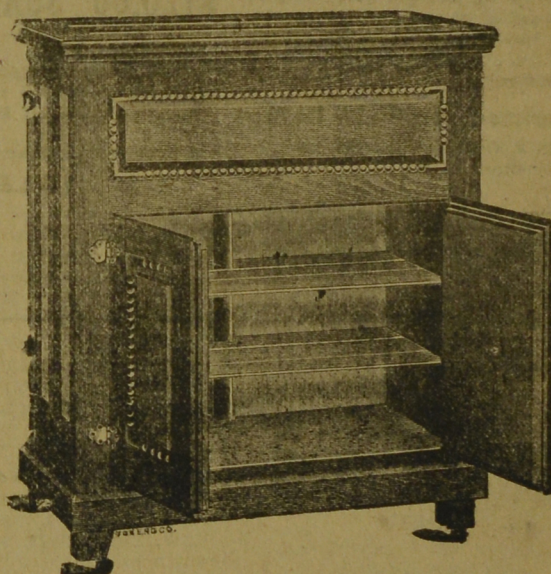
