MILLIONS OF DOLLARS DAMAGE CAUSED BY FIRES IN TEXAS

Paris, Texas, March 22.—With approximately 10,000 persons homeless, the entire business section wiped out, and from fifteen hundred to two thousand dwellings destroyed, the fire, which started late yesterday afternoon, was still burning early today.

The property loss, it is estimated, will reach \$3,500,000. Reports were circulated that from ten to thirty persons had lost their lives. Confirmation, however, was lacking.

Dallas, Texas, March 22.—Fully ten thousand persons are homeless and half that number went without breakfast this morning as a result of last night's fire, according to a telegram received here today from Count Judge Beaucamp, of Paris, Texas. The telegram adds: "We need groceries and money today."

Paris, Texas, March 22.—The fire which swept through this city last

night, destroying approximately thirty blocks, was placed under control. The property loss is estimated all the way from two to five million dollars.

There was no loss of life.

McKinney, Texas, March 22.—Fire starting in a residence here yesterday caused a loss of half a million dollars before being put out. The McKinney Cotton Compress Co., which had three thousand bales of cotton burned, was the heaviest loser.

Tulsa, Okla., March 22.—Damage estimated at more than a million dollars was done in the oil fields near Drumright last night, when a fire beginning in a pile of refuse, spread to the wells. Twelve wells are burning. 24 derricks have been destroyed and many thousands of barrels of oil in tanks consumed by the flames. Oil men fear the loss will extend into many millions of dollars.

GENERAL LOWTHER'S NEW APPOINTMENT

Sir Max Aiken's Book Has a Big
Sale—Capt. Papineau Reaches
London.

London, March 22.—Brigadier General Lowther, who was formerly military secretary to the Duke of Connaught in Canada, is now chief of staff under Lord French, in command of the Home Forces. General Lowther has recovered from wounds received at the front last year. "The excessive sale of "Canada in Flanders" will benefit Canadian war charities, as Sir Max Aitkin is handing over the gross profits to the Red Cross.

Captain E. M. Papineau of the 22nd Battalion, who was recently wounded in the face by shell fragments, has arrived in the Queen Alexandra Hospital in London.

Rev. A. R. Hamilton Dicker, a former rector of St. John, N.B., has been appointed vicar of the U. B. church, Kent.

Agricultural Education Topic For Discussion

The first meeting of the Legislative Committee of Agriculture was held this morning at eleven o'clock with Mr. Young presiding. There was a good attendance of the members. Mr. Young was, on motion, elected chairman and Mr. H. G. Fenety secretary.

Mr. R. P. Steeves, director of elementary agricultural education, addressed the meeting at length, giving a most interesting account of the work accomplished under his department and urged strongly every encouragement of the promotion of rural education in the province. He told of the great advantage such an education was to the youth of the country and how the work of school gardens and the instruction to teachers had increased in the past three years. He also spoke in praise of the assistance given by the agricultural department to the undertaking, both financially and the interest taken. Hon. Mr. Murray and others addressed the meeting along the same lines and Mr. Steeves was interrogated at length on the subject discussed.

The meeting adjourned to convene again at the call of the chair.

Whither she came or whither she is going, is unknown. The Sydney, which destroyed the famous German raider Emden, has been in the Atlantic for several months.

Robson and Roe skated a dead heat in the quarter mile and Robson won the skate-off. No records were made.

Austrians Evacuate Buckowina Capital

London, March 22.—Abandonment of Czernowitz, capital of Bukowina, by the Austrians is reported in an official wireless despatch received here today from Rome.

REDUCTION IN PRISON ESTIMATES

London, March 22.—A reduction in the prison estimates of the British Isles for the coming year of \$500,000, or about 12 per cent., and the shutting up in whole or in part of a score of prisons, are some of the visible evidences of the reduction of crime owing to the war, according to the report of the commissioners of prisons.

CHICAGO WHEAT MARKET IS SOMEWHAT BULLISH

Chicago, March 22.—Fears of a late spring in the northwest and of a delay in movement there has a bullish effect today on wheat. Peace talk, however, acted later as something of an offset. The opening price which varied from 1/8 to 3/4 to 7/8 higher, with May at 109 1/4 to 109 5/8 and July at 108 1/4 to 108 3/4, was followed by a slight further advance and then a material reaction.

THE STOCK MARKET.

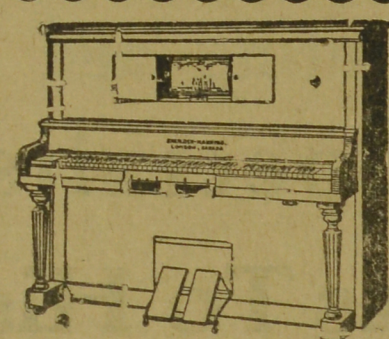
