FREDERICTON BIBLE SOCIETY HELD ANNUAL MEETING

In connection with the Week of Prayer, the annual meeting of the Bible Society was held last evening in the Methodist church. The president, J. W. Spurden, occupied the chair, and the principal speaker of the evening was Rev. A. F. Newcomb. A selection of scriptures was read by Rev. J. E. Wilson and prayer was offered by Capt. Condi of the Salvation Army. In his report Secretary Sampson referred to the loss the Fredericton society had sustained in the death of Mrs. A. F. REV. A. F. NEWCOMB.

Rev. A. F. Newcomb, pastor of the Brunswick Street Baptist church, was the principal speaker and gave an interesting account of the work of the organization. He said that the Bible Society is one of the most fundamental Christian interests which comes before the people of God. In fact, if we are to single out any one interest of the church the work of the Bible Society will be readily recognized as the most basal service which appeals to the sympathies of the Christian world. It is a matter for regret that the district secretary of the Bible Society, my esteemed friend Rev. H. R. Boyer, who is proving so admirable a secretary, could not have been secured for this occasion, for no one keeps so thoroughly conversant with the progress of the work as does he. But as our Bible Society branch had his services last year they doubtless felt that it would be unfair to other places to claim him again so soon.

LOST A GOOD FRIEND.

The Bible Society has lost an ardent supporter in the death of Mrs. A. F. Randolph, whose sympathies were very generously with the Society, who greatly admired the genius and generosity of its ministry, and who aided its work most liberally. We miss very much her sympathy and her help. For many years she was vice-president of our Fredericton branch.

The place of the Bible is fundamental to the development of such a language and literature as we possess, fundamental to national prosperity in the sphere of business and commerce, fundamental to true education, to personal morality, to the maintenance of the church and the extension of the work of the Kingdom of God.

GREATEST INSTITUTION.

The British and Foreign Bible Society is an auxiliary, is the greatest institution on earth for putting the Bible into the hands of mankind in their native tongues. Its work is universal because the Book it publishes and circulates deals in the basal things of life, the elemental considerations which are the same the world over and can never become obsolete. The Bible goes down to the roots of man's real needs, his bitterest sorrows. It deals with an assurance not of this world in the things that are of vital concern to every human creature. It thus emphasizes the things that are of common interest and importance and in this cosmopolitan. It can speak in every language, to every heart and every home. The Bible Society stands uniquely among all the institutions of the world for its vital ministry, so extensively rendered, of giving the Bible to men in their vernacular speech.

SOCIETY'S MARVELOUS OUTPUT.

The issue for 1914—the returns for 1415 are, of course, not yet available—exceeded 10,000,000 copies by 162,313. That was the largest ever reached, and considering the difficulties imposed by the war, is truly phenomenal. For 1913 the figures were 8,958,233 and for 1912, 7,899,562. Some details of circulation may be interesting: In Latin Europe 420,000 volumes; the German and Austrian empires, 1,000,000; in the Russian empire, 750,000; in Africa, 300,000; in Canada, 310,000; in South America, 225,000; in Australia, 150,000; in India and Ceylon, 1,191,000; in Japan, 340,000; in Korea, 755,000; in China, 2,660,000. About 2,000,000 copies were published in English. It will be noticed that more than one-quarter of the society's output found circulation in China.

Even despite the serious effects of

the war, the number of books sold through colportage last year reached a record mark and exceeded five million copies.

SERVICE TO SOLDIERS.

A remarkable service has been rendered to soldiers. Red Cross organizations have been abundantly supplied with copies of Scripture for free distribution among the wounded, among prisoners of war, aliens interned in camp and civilian refugees. Free copies have been distributed among the contingents from the various sections of the empire. The Canadian Bible Society distributed thirty-five thousand New Testaments, bound in khaki, to the troops of the first contingent of the expeditionary force, twenty-five thousand among the men of the second contingent, fifty thousand more have been presented and as many as are needed will be furnished. Our Canadian Society has so far spent \$10,000 on Testaments for our troops. During the first eight months of the war Scriptures were distributed among soldiers to the number of one and a half million copies in twenty languages and in a dozen countries. Up to date figures extend away beyond the two million mark. Isn't that wonderful and significant?

NEARLY 500 TRANSLATIONS.

The Bible Society has been translated into 487 languages, nine new tongues having been added to the list last year.

The Word has been put into thirty-five languages in Braille type for the blind. Think of the fact that a Bible in the Braille type contains 5836 pages, costs \$5 to produce, fills thirty-nine volumes, occupying a shelf of seven feet long. Each volume costs the society between two and three shillings to produce and they are sold at one shilling a piece. During 1912, 5,675 volumes were distributed gratuitously. The total circulation in the organization of the Society in 1904 has been over 263,000,000 copies of which more than 90,000,000 have been in English.

BEHIND THE TIMES.

The work of the Society is indeed vital and basal to a degree and should appeal profoundly to all Christians and to all persons eager for the moral elevation of mankind. It is behind every good work. It has been remarked that the Bible Society is behind the times. That is true, it is behind the times and behind every good cause in our time and every age. The work of the soldier furnishes no analogy that can exhaust the comparison or adequately fill it out. If there were something which furnished the soldier with high ambition, noble character, holy courage, esprit de corps, munitions, all needed information concerning the war that ensured victory to the right army and about successful warfare, his cause; in that case we should find a worthy analogy to show the significance of the Bible and thus of the Society identified most historically and extensively in its circulation. The Bible Society, through its Book, does all this for the Christian soldier, and is indeed behind the moral and spiritual elevation of mankind.

A Greek Christian, writing from Tholcis, desiring to express his appreciation of the peculiar genius of the work of the Bible Society, and having faulty command of his English, wrote:

"The gabs are many; the ghost is me."

Truly the languages are many while the spirit of the Book and the spirit it inspires is one.

The service of a Society doing such a fundamental and far-reaching work commends itself powerfully to followers of Christ. In conjunction with other Bible Societies, our great Society was able last year to contemplate with gratitude a circulation of the Scriptures reaching the marvelous total of sixteen million copies, and a list of six hundred languages into which at least some art of the Bible had found translation. Surely no other interest should be allowed to usurp the place of so glorious a ministry as that rendered by the British and Foreign Bible Society and its energetic and growing daughter, the Canadian Bible Society.
