Hospital was Prof. Simeon Spidle.

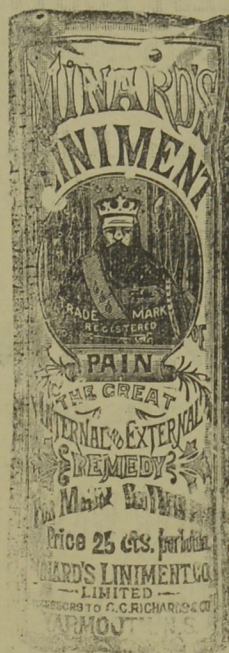
Rev. A. S. Evans, who recently

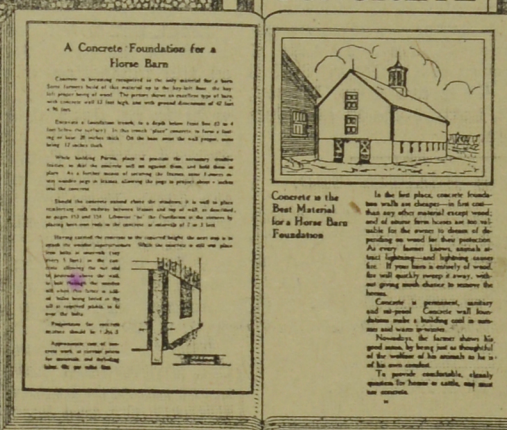
