## GERMAN U. BOATS MAY SOON GET BUSY

New York, July 6.—A special cable from London to the World says:

High naval circles here believe that Germany may soon attempt a minor naval diversion in hope of drawing attention from the land battles.

A similar attempt by Austria would not be surprising, especially as the latter has, except for submarines, played such a small part in the war on the seas.

Intimations by Captain Persius and other German naval writers that the U boats would resume their campaign have not yet materialized, for it is learned that fewer U boats have been in British waters recently than for many months.

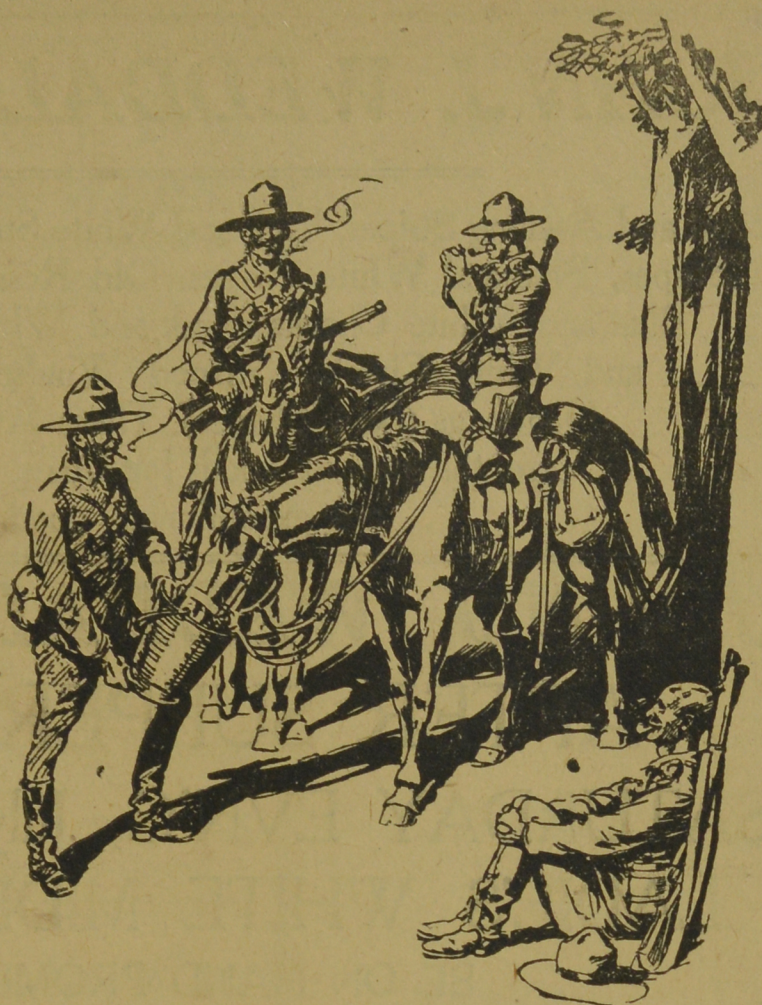

## JELlicoe's OFFICIAL REPORT OF NAVAL BATTLE

British Naval Commander Estimates That the Germans Lost Twenty Ships in Sea Fight off Jutland—Low Visibility Was a Great Aid to the Enemy and Enhanced the Difficulty of Making an Accurate Report.

London, July 6.—"Be pleased to inform the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that the German high sea fleet was brought into action on the 31st of May, 1916, to the westward of Jutland bank, off the coast of Denmark."

In these words Vice Admiral Sir John R. Jellicoe, commander-in-chief of the home fleets, opens his report to the Admiralty on the battle over which there has been so much discussion.

The battle cruiser fleet, gallantly led by Vice Admiral Beatty and admirably supported by the ships of the fifth battle squadron, under Rear Admiral Evans-Thomas, fought the action under at times disadvantageous conditions, especially in regard to the light, in a manner that was in keeping with the best traditions of the service, Admiral Jellicoe continues. Without maps and charts many of the details of the report cannot be made clear. It states that "the list of ships and commanding

Germans; one battle cruiser of the dreadnought type; one battle cruiser seen to be so severely damaged that its return to port was extremely doubtful; five light cruisers seen to sink—one of them possibly a battleship; six destroyers seen to sink; three destroyers so damaged that it was doubtful if they would be able to reach port, and a submarine sunk.

Commenting on the battle, Admiral Jellicoe says:

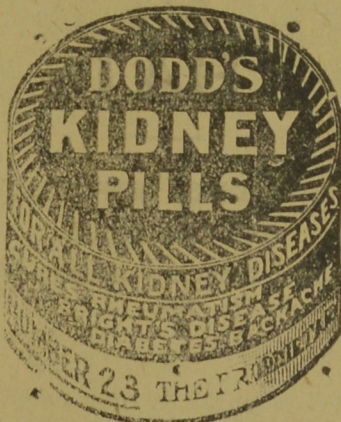
"The conditions of low visibility under which the day action took place, and the approach of darkness, enhanced the difficulty of giving an accurate report of the damage inflicted, or the names of the ships sunk by our forces. After a more careful examination of the evidence of all the officers who testified to seeing enemy vessels actually sink, and personal interviews with a large number of these officers, I am of the opinion that the list shown in the enclosure gives the minimum numbers, though it is possible it is not accurate as regards the particular class of vessels, especially those which were sunk during the night attack. In addition to the vessels sunk, it is unquestionable that many other ships were very seriously damaged by gunfire and torpedo attack."

The German Losses.

Admiral Jellicoe estimates the German losses at two battleships of the dreadnought type, one of the Deutschland type, which was seen to sink; the battle cruiser Lutzow, admitted by the

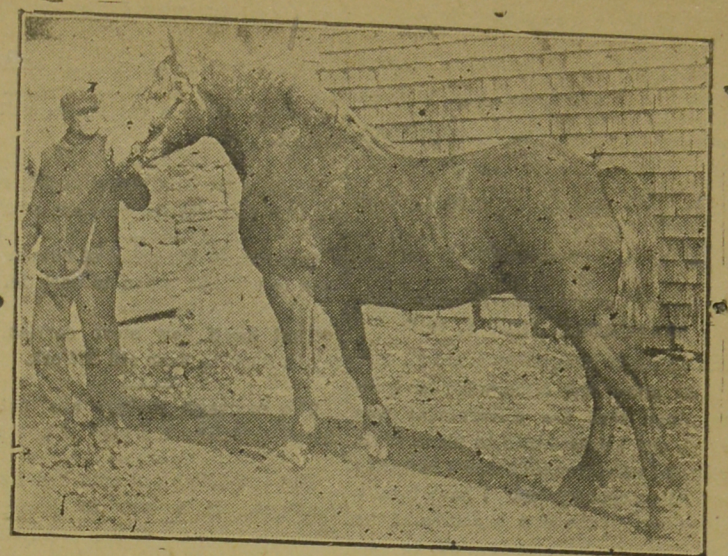
