Tax Notices Now Ready to be Issued
--Issuing of Executions Bringing
In Taxes Which are in
Arrears.

The assessment for 1916 has been made up by the chief assessor, Mr. A. A. Sterling, and tax notices will be issued at once to the ratepayers of the city.

On account of the increased assessment, the tax rate was raised to two dollars on the hundred, the highest in the history of Fredericton.

A general increase in tax bills has thus resulted.

Mr. F. B. Edgcombe has the distinction—enviable or unenviable—of being the largest individual taxpayer in Fredericton. He is assessed for \$1,361. F. B. Edgcombe & Co., the firm in which he is interested, is assessed for the largest amount in the list, \$1,450.

Mr. H. G. Kitchen is another heavy taxpayer, although his assessment is somewhat less than that of Mr. Edgcombe. He is assessed for \$948.

Ex-Ald. A. B. Kitchen is also a heavy taxpayer, his assessment being \$839.

Taxes Coming In.

The action of the City Treasurer in issuing executions for taxes in arrears has had the result of bringing in a considerable amount of back taxes. One delinquent ratepayer, whose name is about the middle of the alphabetical list, appeared at the treasurer's office this morning and paid up, saying he

SURFACE DRAINAGE
OF CITY REQUIRES
CONSIDERABLE WORK

City Engineer McKnight Inspecting
Surface Sewers and Making Nec-
essary Repairs--Numerous
Breaks and Cave-ins.

The surface drainage of Fredericton is receiving considerable attention this summer from the civic Public Works department, attention that is much needed.

City Engineer McKnight had his attention forcibly drawn to defects in the surface drainage during the recent heavy rains, when streets were flooded in several cases through the blocking of sewers.

The City Engineer examined the Northumberland street sewer and found two breaks in it near its mouth on the river bank. These will make it necessary to re-lay about sixty feet of 20 inch terra cotta pipe.

The St. John street sewer was found caved in from its mouth to Queen street. Repairs must be made there.

Two new wells will be constructed on George street, and 676 feet of sewer will be laid to drain that portion of the street behind the old Protestant burying ground, which heretofore has been undrained.


