

## MR. J. B. DAGGETT AND H. M. BLAIR IN LIVELY SCRAP

Woodstock, Sept. 14.—Rev. J. B. Daggett, deputy minister of agriculture, appeared on the hustings this afternoon at an open-air meeting of the government party, and H. M. Blair, the ex-deputy of the Public Works Department, was also present. The wordy tilt between the two was of great interest to the crowd. Blair's quick retorts and undoubted courage in the face of an unfriendly and abusive crowd of Smith followers won him friends among them and there was greater attention to the dialogue between him and Daggett and some others than to the Minister of Agriculture or B. Frank Smith.

### Mr. Daggett Excited.

Finally, when the abuse of the crowd subsided, Blair went into the hotel and there encountered Mr. Daggett, to whom he paid some attention. Daggett rushed upstairs again and to the balcony, interrupting the next speaker and abusing the ex-deputy again. The row started first by some very personal references of Daggett to Blair, and the latter called out: "Here I am, Daggett, now confine yourself to the truth."

Daggett then said, referring to his \$500 payment on the election note, that Blair went to him with tears in his eyes.

Blair—"Read my affidavit, Daggett." Daggett (in furious tones)—"He should be taken out and mobbed."

Then Daggett admitted paying the \$500 to Monahan and getting the same back again from his minister, James A. Murray.

In the meantime there was a rumpus on the street below. Prominent sup-

porters of the government appealed to Blair to leave their meeting alone, but the latter insisted on replying to Daggett's personalities.

The chairman appealed to the crowd not to listen to Blair. "All that he needs," he said, "is a hand organ and a monkey to draw a crowd."

Blair—"Come down; you'll make a first rate monkey."

### The Pugilistic Mr. Smith.

Later Harry Smith, B. Frank Smith's brother, encountered Blair in the hotel and threatened to dislocate his jaw.

Blair invited him to go ahead, when a big fellow named Demerchant proceeded to try to carry out Harry Smith's threat. But there were plenty to interfere had that been necessary. His attempted assault amounted to nothing, but it was wholly unwarranted and created much unfavorable comment from many of Smith's friends.

Blair merely insisted on being heard and his fearlessness in the face of the mob of angry Smith supporters, his retorts and his stinging reminders of what their party and his former friends had been guilty of, placed him in a different and more favorable light with the fair-minded people who witnessed the whole affair.

## ALLIED TRADES MAY STRIKE IN SYMPATHY

New York, Sept. 15.—Plans were discussed today by the leaders of the street railway strike for a sympathetic walk-out of 60,000 to 80,000 workers here in trades allied with the operation of the street car system. James P. Holland, president of the State Federation of Labor, has threatened to call out the workers in these trades if the present deadlock is not broken before tomorrow night.

The Central Labor Union of Brooklyn has endorsed the principle of a sympathetic strike.

This union controls ninety-five local organizations.

Lord Richard Neville, C.M.G., Comptroller to His Royal Highness, and Arthur F. Sladen, private secretary, C. V. O.

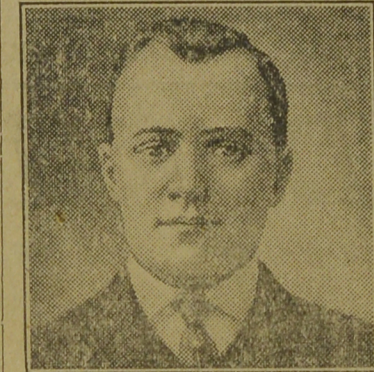

The total allotment of bonds of this issue will be limited to one hundred million dollars exclusive of the amount (if any) paid for by the surrender of bonds as the equivalent of cash under the terms of the War Loan prospectus of 22nd November, 1915.

The instalments may be paid in full on the 16th day of October, 1916, or on any instalment due date thereafter, under discount at the rate of four per cent per annum. All payments are to be made to a chartered bank for the credit of the Minister of Finance. Failure to pay any instalment when due will render previous payments liable to forfeiture and the allotment to cancellation.

Subscriptions, accompanied by a deposit of ten per cent of the amount subscribed, must be forwarded through the medium of a chartered bank. Any branch in Canada of any chartered bank will receive subscriptions and issue provisional receipts.

This loan is authorized under Act of the Parliament of Canada, and both principal and interest will be a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Forms of application may be obtained from any branch in Canada of any chartered bank and at the office of any Assistant Receiver General in Canada.

Subscriptions must be for even hundreds of dollars.

In case of partial allotments the surplus deposit will be applied towards payment of the amount due on the October instalment.

Scrip certificates, non-negotiable or payable to bearer in accordance with the choice of the applicant for registered or bearer bonds, will be issued, after allotment, in exchange for the provisional receipts.

Application will be made in due course for the listing of the issue on the Montreal and Toronto Stock Exchanges.

Recognized bond and stock brokers will be allowed a commission of one-quarter of one per cent on allotments made in respect of applications bearing their stamp, provided, however, that no commission will be allowed in respect of the amount of any allotment paid for by the surrender of bonds issued under the War Loan prospectus of 22nd November, 1915. No commission will be allowed in respect of applications on forms which have not been printed by the King's Printer.
