# TEN ZEPPELINS TOOK PART IN A RAID ON THE ENGLISH COAST

# **Russians** Made Gains in New Drive Against Lemberg

Austrian Official Report Admits That Progress Has Been Made---Ten Zeppelins Took Part in the Latest Air Raid **On London---Airship Destroyed Was Latest Type.** 

VIENNA, via London, Oct. 2.—Gains for the Russians in their new drive toward Lemberg are admitted in a statement issued by the War Office supplementing the official announcement of yesterday.

LONDON, Oct. 2.-Ten Zeppelins took part in last night's raid over England. Two of them attempted to attack London.

One of them was driven away and the other, as was reported last night. was destroyed. Following is an official account of the raid:

"Ten airships crossed the east coast last night between 9 o'clock and midnight. One airship approached the north of London at about 10 p.m., but was driven off by gun fire and pursued by aeroplanes. She attempted to return from the northwest, but was attacked by guns and aeroplanes, and brought to earth in flames in the neighborhood of Potter's Bar shortly before midnight. This airship was one of the latest type.


"A second airship attempted to attack London from the northeast, and Arthur Lacke, N. S. was driven off. Bombs were dropped. No reports of damage or casualties have yet been received. The remaining airships wandered aimlessly over the eastern counties. In Lincolnshire bombs were dropped promiscuously. Most of them appear to have been dropped in open country."

## British Anti-Aircraft Guns Brought

LONDON, Oct. 2.—A writer in a morning newspaper, telling of the winging of the Zeppelin last night, says:

"It was about 11.30 when searchlights fifst began to stab the sky, and a humming in the air indicated the presence of a Zeppelin in this district. At about a quarter to 12 heavy firing

"The guns continued to fire at it, but soon afterward it disappeared. Five minutes later the guns began firing again, and some shells burst very close to their objective. Then a red spot glowed in the sky, just as on the previous occasion, a week ago.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 .- The Paris correspondent of the Herald cabled Sunday as follows:

A mighty drive on Constantinople may bring a decision in the war before the end of the present year.

The knowledge that this drive is coming is regarded as the explanation of the alarm felt in Germany, as shown by the refusal of the private bankers and moneyed classes to subscribe to the new lean, and by the speech delivered on Thursday last in the Reichestag by the Chancellor of the Empire, with its appeal for new sacrifices.

The preparations for the march on the Turkish capital have lone been underway, and as there is now no longer any motive for concealment, the subject is being alluded to in a rather frank manner in the press of the Allies. and a

# The Jews in Russia are to Have Much

Greater Educational Advantages in Future

PETROGRAD, via London, Oct. 2 .- Jews will enjoy greater educational advantages in Russia in the future. A series of high schools and technical schools, exclusively for Jewish students, is to be established and greater freedom will be accord-

The Russian government in the interest of education extends this greater advantage to the Jews. In addition to the large number of schools exclusively for Jewish students which exist at the present time, permission has been granted for the establishment of Jewish gymnasiums in Petrograd, Kiev and other cities and towns, as well as colleges, among which is the Polytechnic Institution at Yekaterinoslav.
