GIBSON RESIDENCE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Home of A. Turner B. Howard Burned
Sunday --Woman Seriously
Injured

The residence owned by Mr. A. Turner B. Howard in Gibson was practically destroyed by fire Sunday morning. The contents are a total loss.

The house was occupied by the owner, his brother, Mr. Richard Howard, and the wife of the latter and their adopted son. The family was at breakfast when the fire began. It caught in the kitchen, from the stove, it is supposed. The first intimation those at breakfast had that there was a fire in the next room was upon hearing the fall of a table, the legs of which had been burned through. On opening the door they were met with a gust of smoke and fire. Mrs. Howard fainted and fell, with the result that she received severe burns about the head.

The flames swept through the dwelling, which was a frame structure, and had complete control before the arrival of the Gibson fire department. A high wind was blowing but the firemen kept the fire from spreading. The upper story was almost burned off and the ground floor much damaged.

while Victoria and Albert are the only two counties in the province occupying the inglorious position of not having as yet provided a recruit for the Kilties.

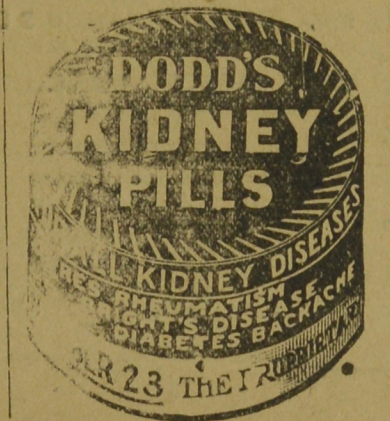
Returned Soldier Enlists.

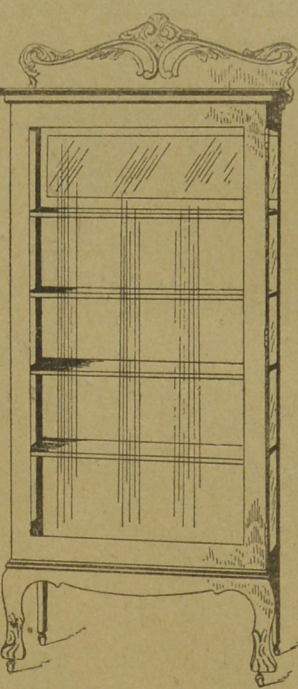

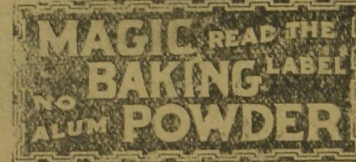
