MAJOR J.F. WANDLESS
WOUNDED IN LEG
DURING BIG DRIVE

Joined 74th Overseas Battalion at Toronto--Two Brothers Also Serving--Veteran of South African War--Served in S.A.C.

Major John F. Wandless, formerly of Fredericton, has been wounded on the Canadian front in France. Relatives in Fredericton received the news yesterday. He was wounded in the leg during the recent British offensive on the Somme, and is now in hospital.

Major Wandless is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Wandless of this city. At the time of the South African war he was teaching school in this county. He enlisted with a reinforcing draft for the 2nd Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment, and served with that unit for some time. Later in the war he joined the South African Constabulary under Baden-Powell and he was with that body for several years.

After returning to Canada he located in Toronto, where he was closely identified with the cadet movement. During the present war, when the 74th Overseas Battalion was raised in Toronto, he was appointed a captain. After the arrival of the battalion in England he was promoted to the rank of major and served in France in that capacity.

Major Wandless has two brothers serving with the C. E. F. Gunner Hollingworth T. Wandless left with the 24th Field Battery. Private Loring B. Wandless enlisted with the 55th Battalion, and was drafted to the front. He has been in the trenches for some months.

FIRST WEEK OF
RECRUITING CAMPAIGN
FINDS 137 VOLUNTEERS

Better Results Expected This Week--Returned Soldiers Reenlist Here--Three Recruits Here For Forestry Battalion.

The first full week of the recruiting campaign for the 236th Highland Battalion, New Brunswick's first kilted corps, closed last night. The result was one hundred and thirty-seven volunteers for the unit. That number of men have given in their names. Others expected to volunteer will bring the total number up to one hundred and fifty. There will be some rejections on the medical examination, but the strength of the Kilties should near the 300 mark.

Better results are expected from this week's campaign.

Results by Counties.

Northumberland, with a crackerjack meeting at Chatham on Sunday night, at which Lieut. Col. Guthrie and his party obtained fourteen recruits, now heads the list of counties of the province with a total of twenty-six recruits for the week. Restigouche is second, with a total of twenty-three. Then follows St. John with nineteen, one of the few disappointments of the province.

York county finds itself equalled by Madawaska, surely somewhat disappointing too, with ten recruits, and behind Carleton county, which has furnished twelve.

Gloucester county has provided nine, Kings eight, Westmorland seven, and Charlotte four; Kent the same number; Queens three and Sunbury two.

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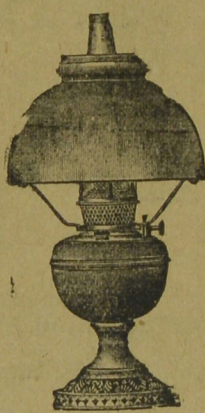
