CHANGES ON THE STAFF OF MOUNT A. INSTITUTION

Sackville, N.B., July 8.—A number of changes are to take place in the teaching staff of Mount Allison Ladies' College in the coming year, owing to the departure of some members of last year's staff. The resignation of Miss Elva Machum has necessitated the appointment of a new instructor in French and English essays, which position has been filled by Miss Ella Stanley, M.A.

Miss Stanley graduated from Oberlin College and later received her M.A. from that institution. She holds also an M.A. from Columbia University, and studied for a time abroad. She has a wide teaching experience and comes to Mount Allison highly spoken of by her former associates.

The vacancy made by the resignation of Miss Winifred Thomas, B.A., who for the past year has taught Bible and history, has been filled by Miss Leah Borden, B.A. Miss Borden graduated from the University in 1910, since which time she has had a valuable and successful teaching experience in the public schools of Nova Scotia. As a student she made an exceptionally good record, and her return to Mount Allison on the teaching staff of the Ladies' College is heartily endorsed by the authorities.

In addition to the changes mentioned, an instructor has been secured for the gymnasium work of the girls. Marion Ferguson will assume control of this department and will supervise the physical development of the students during the year. This branch of college work is receiving more and more attention from the larger ladies' colleges of the continent every year, and Mount Allison will be prepared to offer advantages equal to any. Miss Ferguson is a graduate of the Posse School of Physical Education, and has a record of successful teaching along her chosen line.

Following out the progress which has been made by Mount Allison in the past few years in the matter of increase in staff and teaching facilities, an arrangement has been made to

strengthen the theological staff during the ensuing year by the appointment of an additional professor. Rev. Joan Line, M.A., B.D., has been engaged to take up the work of teaching homiletics, church polity, didactics, public speaking, philosophy of theism, and other subjects.

Mr. Line is a graduate of the University of Toronto and holds both degrees from that institution. During the past year he has had successful teaching experience in that University, while giving lectures in philosophy. He is recognized as a profound thinker with a thorough knowledge of his subjects, and a keen sense of the growth and development of philosophic ideas.

Chancellor Bowles of Victoria College, and Dr. Abbott, the head of the philosophy department in Toronto University, are very outspoken in their recommendation of Mr. Line as a constructive thinker, and a theologian of the advanced though not radical type. His appointment will add materially to the advantages which Mount Allison offers her theological students.

Sailor Poisoned By Bay Rum

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 12.—Eldon Whynot, aged 30, a sailor on the Lunenburg fishing schooner Emily Selig, died on board while on the fishing ground off Naufrage on Sunday.

The vessel returned to Souris, and an inquest was held.

The evidence showed that he was sick Sunday and died the following day. He was in swimming on Saturday, seemed to get chilled and took a drink of bay rum.

The verdict of the jury was accidental poisoning from drinking bay rum.

GERMAN SOLDIERS MUST PICK RAGS

Leather and Metal Articles Must be Collected From the Dead In Future.

London, July 12.—Judging from a recent German army order, which has just reached London, every German general will soon be leading an army of rag pickers. The time is not far distant when the German soldiers will use their bayonets to prod rubbish heaps in search of rags, waste paper, empty cans and old bottles.

The order states that economy on the battlefield will henceforth be essential. German soldiers must exercise minute care as ragpickers and bags must be accurately counted and none must be lost, under heavy penalties.

All leather and metal articles must be carefully collected, the dead, both friends and enemies, stripped of boots and clothing.

Dead bodies will no longer be allowed to be wrapped in canvas.

The whole tenor of the order suggests that the German shortage of war material is becoming serious.

REV. NEIL McLAUGHLIN RETURNS TO ST. JOHN

Rev. Neil McLaughlin arrived in the city this week on the Royal Mail Steam Packet liner Caraque, to assume the pastorate of Portland Street Methodist church, of which he had charge several years ago. On leaving St. John he removed to Fredericton, and, after a successful pastorate there, was transferred to Bermuda.

Mr. McLaughlin is accompanied by his wife and son. During his former pastorate in St. John he made many friends here and left a deep impression on the community. He will receive a warm welcome as he takes up his new duties.

The Royal Gazette, of Hamilton, Bermuda, devotes a column of space to an account of a congregational meeting at which members of his last flock bade farewell to their pastor.

The Gazette says: "After two years of faithful, earnest labor, which has left its impress for good on every branch of church work, Mr. McLaughlin has been called to return north. Wesley church deeply regrets that so soon they are to lose a pastor who has admirably adapted himself to a Bermuda charge, and who, with his wife, has endeared himself to the entire membership."

During the evening a farewell gift was presented to Mr. and Mrs. McLaughlin by members of the congregation, and they were remembered also by the naval choir, composed of members of the crews of British warships in port, "as a mark of the choir's appreciation of the welcome and affection meted to the sailor and soldier lads by the pastor and people of Wesley church."
