BRITISH RECOVER GROUND LOST TO THE GERMANS

London, July 12.—The British have retaken the ground lost last night to the Germans, according to the official statement issued tonight, and now hold all of Mametz wood. Two German attacks against Contalmaison were repulsed. The text reads:

"The day was marked by sharp local fighting in certain areas in the Mametz wood. We recaptured all the ground lost last night, and now hold the whole wood.

"We also made some progress in the Trones wood. The very large number of German dead in this vicinity shows the costliness of their attack last night.

"Two heavy German attacks against Contalmaison completely broke down under our fire."

Russians Still Victorious.

Petrograd, July 12, via London, July 13.—Russian troops have captured the town of Mamakhatum, fifty miles west

of Erzerum, on the Tuzlu river, by assault, says the official statement given out by the War Office tonight. The retreating Turks set fire to the town. Following is the statement:

"Our artillery dispersed Germans who were attempting to bring artillery against the Ikskul works. In the sector of the Tscherkassy Farm, south of Krevo, the Germans, supported by a violent artillery fire, took the offensive, but were repulsed by our counter attack.

"On the Stokhod there were artillery duels. In the region of the village of Wachovka the enemy attempted to approach the Stokhod, but was repulsed by our fire.

"On the Caucasus front, west of Erzerum, our troops, having repulsed the Turks, took the town of Mamakhatum by assault. In the course of their retreat the enemy set fire to the town. We took measures to extinguish the flames."

Heavy Artillery Fire.

Petrograd, via London, July 12.—The following official statement on military operations was issued today by the Russian army headquarters:

"On the whole front, from Riga to Polesie, there was intermittent artillery and rifle fire. German aviators dropped bombs on the station of Zarnie and the town of Niesvil, where several houses were set on fire.

"Persistent fighting continues on the Stokhod front. On July 10, we made prisoner 24 officers and 745 German and Austrian soldiers.

"On the Baltic our torpedo boat destroyers, during operations in the Gulf of Bothnia, captured two large German steamers, one of which was loaded with iron ore. They brought both vessels into our ports.

"On the Caucasus front to the west of Erzerum, we made considerable progress and captured a new line of fortified Turkish positions.

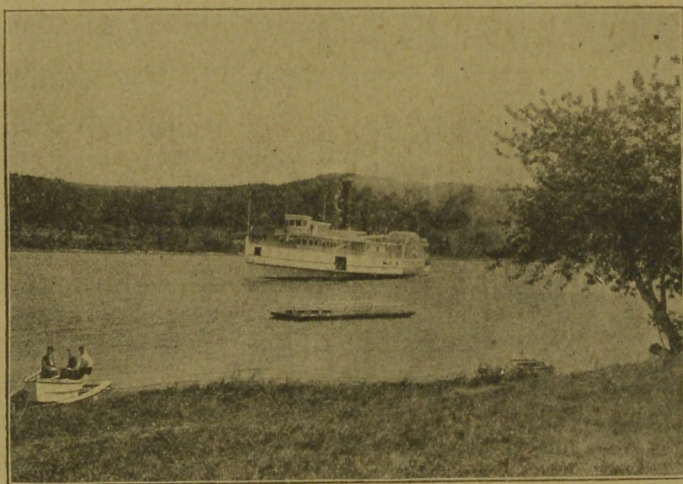
"Prisoners continue to be brought in. From the 2nd to the 8th inst., 107 officers, 1,684 men, three guns, ten machine guns and four bomb-throwers were captured. A large quantity of arms and war material was left on the line of retreat followed by the Turks."

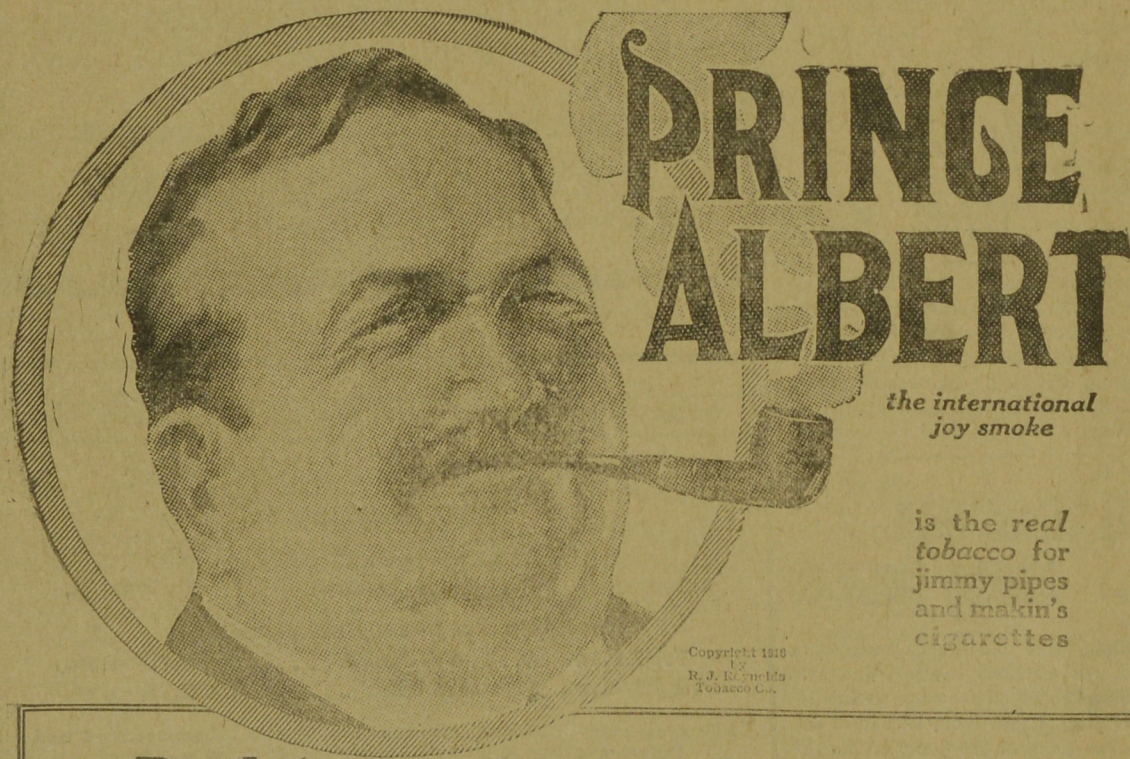

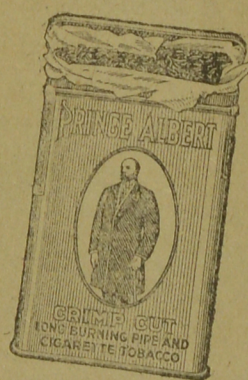
