SCOURGE STILL DECREASING.

Slight Decrease in Deaths and Cases of Infantile Paralysis in N. Y.

New York, Aug. 16.—A slight decrease in deaths and new cases in the epidemic of infantile paralysis was noted today in the health department bulletins on the progress of the disease.

During the 24 hours preceding 10 a.m. the plague killed 34 children in the five boroughs of New York city; 113 were stricken. This compares with yesterday's figures of 39 deaths and 163 new cases. Since the inception of the disease in June 6,635 cases have been reported to the health department, 1,497 of which proved fatal.

British Take No Special Steps.

London, Aug. 16.—No special steps are considered necessary by the British government in connection with the epidemic of infantile paralysis in New York, according to a statement made in the House of Commons.

Proposals had been made to enforce a quarantine.

Engineering Camp.

The engineering camp of the University of New Brunswick will be held this year on the Experimental Farm, near Doak Station. Camp will begin August 28th. Prof. John A. Stiles will be in charge. The courses of instruction will include railway construction, traverse surveys, topographical surveying, hydrographical surveying and field astronomy.

LEFT FOR ENGLAND

Recommended For Commissions in Imperial Army.—Recruits for 236th.

Lieut. Roy W. Mordock, Lieut. Rupert L. Perry, and Lieut. R. N. Gilmour, who had been serving in the ranks of the 236th Highlanders, left this morning for Halifax in pursuance to instructions. They were on the list of officers recommended by Lieut. Col. P. A. Guthrie for appointment as subalterns in the Imperial army. They will proceed to England shortly.

The three officers were escorted to the C. P. R. station this morning by the pipers of the 236th Battalion and by officers and men of the same.

Two carloads of clothing and equipment have arrived here from ordnance stores at St. John for the Highlanders. The lower story of the Park Barracks has been fitted up for quartermasters' stores. Clothing and equipment will be issued from there.

Three recruits were enlisted here this morning for the 236th. They are George L. White, 17, Fredericton; C. S. Bonnell, 19, St. John; H. C. Treen, 26, St. John.

Public Schools Notice.

FOR the special benefit of pupils who have reached Grade VI and who are unable to continue the common school course, the Trustees will open a pre-vocational department in the York Street School building. Applicants for admission to this department will file their names with the Secretary and obtain an admission certificate.

In accordance with the Compulsory Schools Act, all children from six to fourteen years of age must be in attendance at school. In every case the reason for non-attendance must be given to the Board of School Trustees by the parent or guardian of the child.

In pursuance of Sec. 73 of the Schools Act, the Secretary is required in every case to demand a physicians' certificate or other evidence of recent successful vaccination before a permit may be issued.

All the schools will be re-opened on Monday, 28th inst., at 9 o'clock, a.m., and permits may be obtained at the office on York street during the previous week. Applicants for admission to the Model School, whose names have been registered, will apply for permits on Friday, 25th inst.
