THE RETAIL MERCHANTS CLOSE MEETING TODAY

The convention of the New Brunswick Branch of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada will hold its final session here this afternoon and after the session will visit the factories of the Hartt Boot & Shoe Company, the Palmer-McLellan Shoe-pack Company and the John Palmer Company.

Officers Elected.

At last evening's session the first matter dealt with was the election of officers. It resulted as follows: President, A. Murray, Fredericton, N.B.

1st Vice-President, F. W. Daniel, St. John, N.B.
2nd Vice-President, W. G. DeWolfe, St. Stephen, N.B.
Treasurer, Allgn McIntyre, St. John, N.B.

The matter of appointing a provincial secretary was left to the incoming executive.

The fourth session resumed for business this morning in the Board of Trade rooms, at which several important resolutions of interest to the retail trade were passed.

Yesterday Afternoon.

After a short session yesterday afternoon the delegates visited Mar-

ville and inspected the mill of Canadian Cottons Limited. During the business session, Vice-President Murray called on Mr. E. M. Trowern, Dominion Secretary, to speak to the convention. As Mr. Trowern rose to speak, he was warmly applauded. In his remarks Mr. Trowern said that this organization was formed to put down all evil practices in the retail trade and said that ninety-seven per cent of the retail men were "decent men" and three per cent were "shysters." He stated that the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada were here to compel these "shysters" to run a clean business. Mr. Trowern then stated that the T. Eaton Company had been brought up in the courts of Toronto three or four times for false advertising, but because Sir John Eaton was a wealthy man and for other reasons too numerous to mention, the cases were thrown from the courts without any action being taken. The Dominion Secretary then mentioned a few things which should be put down by the Association, after which the passing of resolutions was dealt with for a few minutes, but on account of the rapidly passing time, this had to be left over until the evening session.

Teddy Roosevelt For President

New York, April 13.—The New York Tribune, Republican, today editorially announced its support of Col. Roosevelt for the Republican Presidential nomination, declaring ex-Senator Root, its former favorite, has been practically eliminated, but should be named Secretary of State in the next administration.

"Col. Roosevelt and no-pushy-footing" was the slogan of the editorial.

Want U. S. Troops Withdrawn

Mexico City, April 13.—The Mexican government has sent to its ambassador in Washington a note to be delivered at ten o'clock to Secretary of State Lansing, asking that the American troops be withdrawn from Mexican territory and that the pursuit of Villa be left to the Mexican constitutional army.

It has been known since the appointment of ex-Ald. City officials are to be appointed tonight by the City Council.

Quebec House Is Dissolved

Quebec, April 13.—Provincial parliament has been dissolved. Nominations are to be made May 15, polling on the 22nd.

The present government, of which Sir Lomer Gouin is the Premier, was elected May 15, 1912, their term of office not expiring until May 1917. The standing of the parties at dissolution is, Liberals 60 and Conservatives 18.

While there had been considerable talk of an election for this year, little of a definite nature has been heard lately, and today's announcement came as a surprise to most people.

Dissolution was decided on at a meeting of the provincial cabinet this morning.

Hon. Jules Allard, minister of crown lands, and Mr. Perron, member for Vercheres, are both made members of the Legislative Council. They replace Messrs. Bereard and de Boucherville.

EXCITEMENT AT OTTAWA OVER FALSE REPORT

Ottawa, April 13.—Ottawa was considerably agog today over a report that Hon. Sir Sam Hughes had arrived in the capital in the cold gray dawn of the morning. It was asserted that he had landed at St. John and had come to Ottawa by a special train.

A number of personages were at the department to meet him.

The General, however, has not yet come, and there appears to be some uncertainty when, as the ship he is crossing on may arrive in New York tomorrow or possibly not till the beginning of the week.

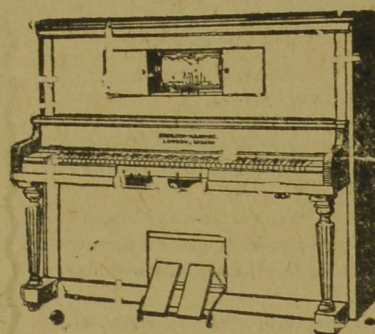
