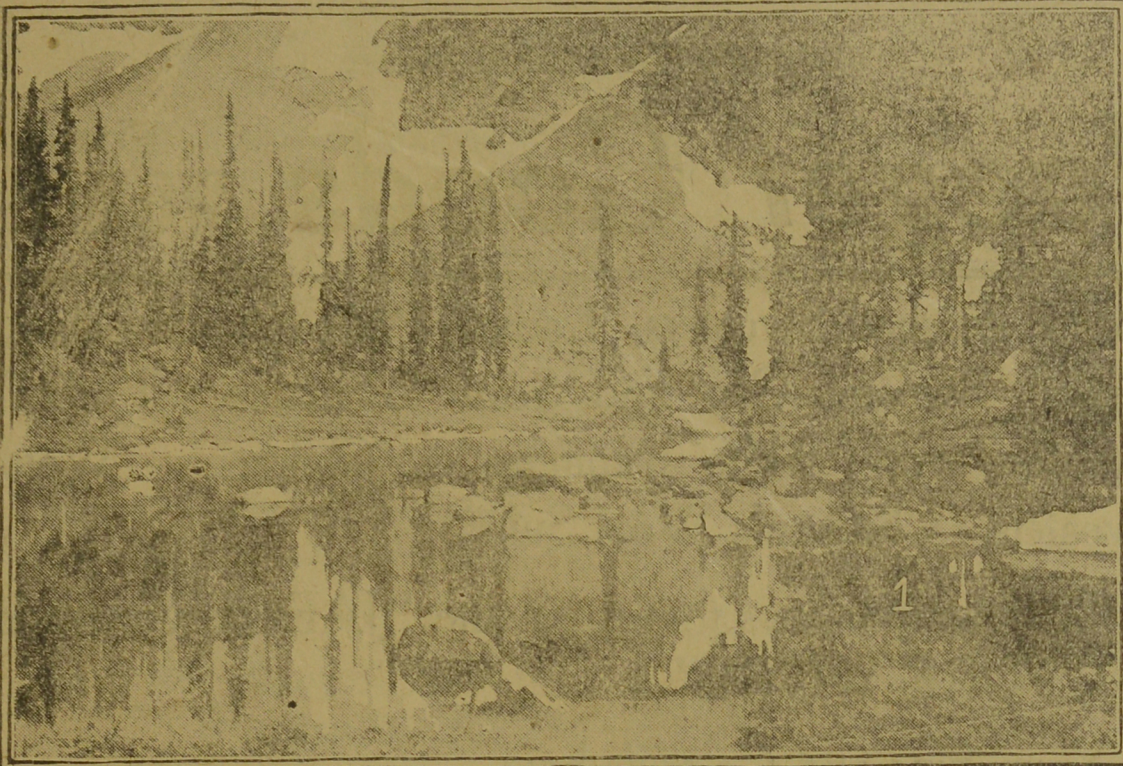
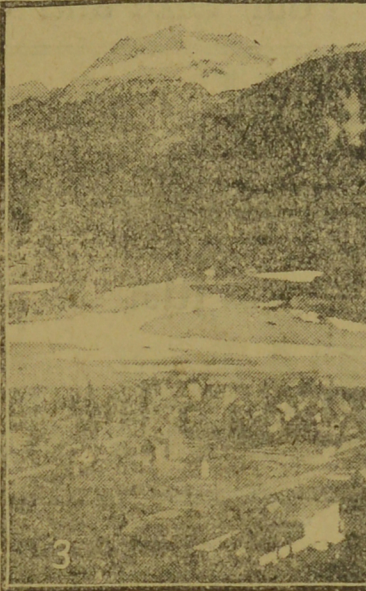
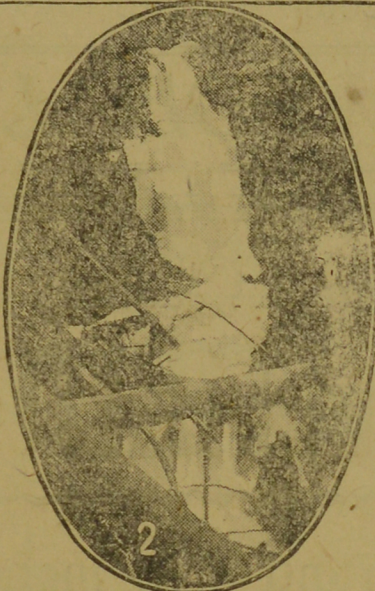


## REVELSTOKE and its BEAUTIES

REVELSTOKE is situated on the Canadian Pacific Railway about half way between Steamboat and Glacier. It is a town of about 4,500 people, having altogether nine hotels, the leading hotel being the "Revelstoke," situated right at the Depot. Revelstoke is most picturesquely situated in the Valley of the Columbia River, and practically surrounded by mountains. Mount Begbie is always an interesting sight, and the Glacier on Mount Begbie can always be seen from Revelstoke. The view from the hotel on a summer evening is magnificent. There are two trips from this place which are absolutely unique in the whole Canadian Pacific Rockies. One trip is nine miles north of Revelstoke, along the Columbia River to Silver Tip Falls, through the famous Columbia Canyon, which for scenic beauty and thrills is unsurpassed on the American Continent; and the other is up Mount Revelstoke. The Dominion Government is now building an automobile road from Revelstoke to the top of this mountain, and has recently expended \$200,000.00 on this road, which is now ten miles up the mountain. The road zig-zags up the mountain, having an excellent grade, a high-powered automobile being able



to go up this road on high gear. Tourists who have made this trip as far as the road is completed, claim that there is no trip on the American continent that can compare with it.

Should tourists be desirous, arrangements can be made to have saddle horses awaiting them at the end of the automobile road, so that they can continue to the top of Mount Revelstoke where a most beautiful natural park is situated.

In the months of July and August, this park is a most brilliant panorama of color, being covered with the most beautiful of wild flowers, which give the appearance of the whole mountain top being one glorious mass of red, yellow, and green, in the centre of which are Lakes Eva, Miliar, and Prospect, the background being the famous Revelstoke glacier. The lakes are about five miles from the end of the automobile road.

## ROUMANIA WITH THE ALLIES.

German Press is Authority for the Information.

London, Aug. 23.—Dealing with the intentions of Roumania, the Daily News says:

## THE BLACK LIST CONTROVERSY

Allied Embassies are Now Making Inquiries as to the Workings of So-called Anti-Black List.

Washington, Aug. 23.—The so-called anti-black list provision in the administration ship bill authorizing customs officials to withhold clearance to any ship refusing American cargo except for the reason of being fully laden, has attracted the attention of the Allied Embassies and they are making inquiries which may result in representations to the State Department.

The provision was inserted in the Senate at the last moment because of penalties attached to ships which carry blacklisted cargo.

The Allied embassies may contend that it violates treaty provisions.

## AFTER CANADIAN SECURITIES.

Must be Deposited With the British Treasury Without Delay.

London, Aug. 23.—Further measures are contemplated by the government to bring about the mobilization of such Canadian and neutral securities as have not been turned over to the government. In the House of Commons today the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Reginald McKenna, said it was the intention of his department to apply to parliament for power to impose a further income tax of two shillings on the returns from all such securities which have not been deposited with the treasury. He added that he trusted every one would realize that it was a public duty to deposit securities without delay.
