HOW ENGLAND FARES ON WAR TIME RATIONS

(By Mary Boyle O'Reilly.)
London, Eng., Aug. 23.—England, bereft of two-thirds of its shipping, is consuming as little as possible.

The world hears much of German war economies, but the 5,000,000 Englishwomen now existing on separation allowances bravely keep their own counsel.

Before the war the average German spent \$115 a year, the average Britain \$200.

Now the Britain must come down to the frugal German scale if the British are to wear their enemies out.

The war has become one of economic endurance—a war of non-combatants!

Twenty million people must work harder to support the 10,000,000 who are making armament, instruments of death.

Women must be thrifty, facing this financial parallel:

1 woman's hat.....4 steel helmets
1 new dress.....4 service rifles
1 fur coat.....1 machine gun
Every penny saved helps England; every penny wasted aids Germany.

That's why hundreds of thousands of English women gather weekly to learn how to save.

These war talks are deadly practical. There is no tommyrot.

"We must all pull in!" declares the woman economist—sometimes a college professor, sometimes a level-headed duchess.

"We must make up our minds to be poor. The government is purchasing supplies and services; the public cannot claim them!"

"War housekeeping is the order of the day! Waste, always folly, is in war time treason."

"Raw potato peelings thrown away cost 25 cents a week per family—\$130,000,000 a year for the nation."

"If every man wastes a match a day and every woman one, the price of wasted matches would buy three torpedo boat destroyers."

"With sugar at 12c. a pound, if all consumers use one lump less a day, the year's saving will be \$20,000,000."

War mothers have learned a pennyworth of oatmeal and milk is worth fourpence of bread and coffee.

Middle class families are living as their grandparents lived in a simpler period.

British Advance In East Africa

London, Aug. 24.—An important advance in the campaign for the conquest of German East Africa is reported in a Reuter despatch from Nairobi, British East Africa.

The despatch says that the British troops under Lieut. Col. Vanderventer on Aug. 22 entered the town of Kilossa, near the Wami river. The British sustained few casualties.

Petrograd, Aug. 24.—Teutonic forces have begun determined attacks against the Russians who recently forced their way across to the west bank of the Stokhod.
