German Gunboat Sunk in Duel With the Belgian Gunboat Netta on Lake Tanganyika

HAVRE, Aug. 3.—The sinking of the German gunboat Graff Von Gotzen in a duel with the Belgian gunboat Netta, on Lake Tanganyika, is announced in an official statement issued by the Belgian War Office. The text of the statement follows:
