

PRESIDENT WILSON AND WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Washington, Aug. 2.—President Wilson has not changed his position, that the woman suffrage question had been dealt with by the States, it was announced at the White House.

The statement was brought forth by the announcement yesterday of Chas. E. Hughes, the Republican nominee, that he favored an amendment to the Federal Constitution giving the vote to women.

PROCLAMATION

BY HIS HONOUR JOSIAH WOOD,
D. C. L., LL. D., LIEUTENANT-
GOVERNOR OF THE PROVINCE
OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

Whereas, the 4th of August, 1916, is the second anniversary of the declaration of war by Great Britain, and whereas it has been proposed by the Central Committee for National Patriotic Organizations, with the approval of the British Government, that public meetings be held throughout the Empire on that day, at which the following resolution should be passed:

"That on this the second anniversary of the declaration of a righteous war, this meeting of the citizens of records its inflexible determination to continue to a victorious end the struggle in maintenance of those ideals of Liberty and Justice which are the common and sacred cause of the Allies."

And whereas the Executive Council of this Province has passed an Order-in-Council authorizing a Proclamation to issue requiring the assembling of the people together on that day for said purpose.

We therefore hereby request and enjoin that all loyal citizens throughout the province do meet on said 4th day of August and pass the said Resolution, and in view of the gravity of the situation and the solemnity of the occasion, the day be also observed by holding meetings of a religious and intercessory, as well as patriotic character.

Given under my hand and seal at Fredericton, the twenty-fourth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, and in the seventh year of His Majesty's reign.

SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATES IN MATRICULATION EXAMS.

Results Given Out by the Education Office
---St. John Student Leads the Province
---Three Fredericton High School Graduates in First Division.

The Board of Examiners for the University Matriculation and High School Leaving examination for 1916 have completed their work, and report the following results:

There were 160 candidates who wrote the Matriculation examinations, of whom 7 wrote the subjects for engineering only. Twenty-seven candidates wrote the High School Leaving examinations.

Of the Arts Matriculation candidates 19 passed in the first, 77 in the second, 28 in the third, and 26 in the third division conditionally, while 3 failed.

Of those who wrote the Engineering Matriculation examination, 1 passed in the second, 1 in the third and 3 in the third division conditionally, while 2 failed.

Of the 27 candidates taking the leaving examinations, 1 passed in the first 17 in the second, 3 in the third and 6 in the third division conditionally.

MANY WERE BURNED BEYOND RECOGNITION

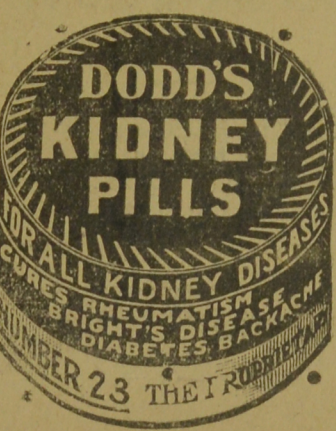
North Bay, Ont., Aug. 2.—There has been no further list of victims received from the northern fires since last night.

Commissioner Lee stated this morning that it would be probably weeks or months before a full list is completed. Many bodies are burned beyond recognition and identification is almost impossible.

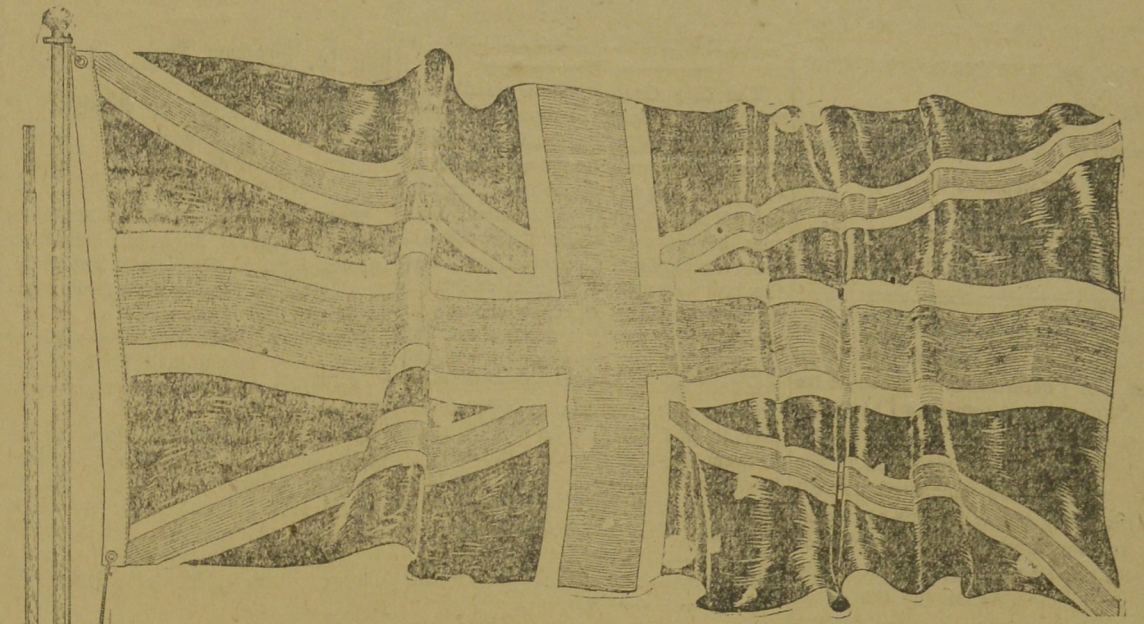
