SHACKELTON IS ON HIS WAY SOUTH

Panama, Oct. 26.—Sir Ernest Shackleton, who has arrived here from Lima, will leave on Sunday for New Orleans on the steamer Parismina, on the way to San Francisco. From that city he will start for Australia to send a relief party to rescue the ten members of the Shackleton party who were left with scanty provisions on the west side of the Antarctic continent.

The ten men of the Shackleton party still in the Antarctic were landed from the Aurora and were marooned there when their vessel was caught in the ice and carried away.

MERRILL WAS ACQUITTED ON GROUND OF INSANITY

Slayer of I. C. R. Clerk at Moncton Will
Be Sent to the Provincial Hospital—Jury
Acquitted Him at the Request of the At-
torney General—The Judge's Remark's
---Service at the Front no Excuse for
Breaking the Civil Law.

Dorchester, N. B., Oct. 26.—Captain John E. Merrill, charged with the murder of John F. Rogers at Moncton, was found not guilty, on the ground of insanity today, and will be sent to the Provincial Hospital at Fairville.

This verdict was reached at the request of Attorney General Baxter, who was prosecuting, following the presentation of evidence by the defence.

Morning Session.

George Riedout, chief of police of Moncton, was the first witness in the murder trial this morning, and gave evidence as to the condition of the accused when he interviewed him in the police station on the evening of the tragedy. Riedout's evidence concluded the testimony for the prosecution.

E. R. McDonald opened the case for the defence and spoke at some length, after which Geo. E. Boak, merchant, of Halifax, took the stand.

Mr. Boak was a passenger on the train with the accused on the day of the shooting and had considerable conversation with him in the smoking compartment of a Pullman car. His evidence was remarkable in view of some of the statements which the accused made to him with reference to his private life, and as to his future intentions, and a hush prevailed over the court room while he told his story.

Lieut. Chas. P. Inches, of the 3rd Canadian Garrison Artillery, St. John, exhibited a service roll on that battery which showed that on Sept. 17, 1914, the accused enlisted with that unit as a private.

Howard Ryan, brother-in-law of the accused, a petty officer on H. M. S. Niobe at Halifax, followed Lieutenant Inches, and told the story of Merrill's life. He stated that Merrill was in the Army Service Corps in February, 1915, and that he did not see him again until Oct. 1, the day Merrill arrived from England.

Had Flourished Revolver.

Mrs. Mireux Ryan, wife of Petty Officer Ryan, and Mrs. Pauline Neilson, also gave evidence and startled the court by their evidence, which was to the effect that Merrill had presented his revolver to their heads on several occasions while the guest of Mrs. Ryan's husband. They stated that they saw no evidence of intoxication while he was in Halifax.

This afternoon Lieut. Roy Edwards, of the 246th Battalion, Halifax, a returned officer, swore that he met Merrill in Halifax at the recruiting offices of the battalion and that Merrill had at that time decorations on his uniform which he believed were given him on account of his being gassed. Papers were exhibited in court at this stage showing that Merrill had been a second lieutenant in the Imperial army.

Lieut. Edwards stated further that he knew the prisoner had been through the battles of St. Eloi and Ypres and that it was customary for the officers in this country to carry revolvers.

At this stage of the proceedings the Attorney General arose and stated to his honor that it was an established fact that the accused had been a second lieutenant with the Imperial army, that when he opened the case for the crown he had been under the impression that the unfortunate affair was due to excessive drinking on the part of the accused, but that he was now convinced that Merrill was temporarily insane at the time of the shooting. He would therefore ask his honor, if he saw fit, to instruct the jurors to bring in a verdict of not guilty because of insanity.

Major Hanington, for the defence, concurred with the statements of the Attorney General.

Judge Chandler then addressed the jury and made touching references to the memory of the deceased young man, John Fletcher Rogers, and the members of his family. He then pointed out that the law provided that if a jury acquitted a prisoner because of insanity, the prisoner must be kept in close confinement to await the pleasure of the Lieutenant Governor.

Judge Chandler further stated that this meant that the prisoner would be in all probability removed from the Dorchester jail to the Provincial Hospital at Fairville, and remain there at the pleasure of the Governor.

He issued a warning to the effect that the procedure in this case did not mean that any man returning from the front was at liberty to break the civil law and escape punishment because of his service at the front, but that every case, as this was, would be tried on its merits.

The jury, after being out seven minutes, brought in a verdict as recommended, after which his honor ordered Captain Merrill confined in the county jail to await the pleasure of Lieut. Governor Wood.

NEW CHAMPION DAIRY COW.

Queen Piebe Mercedes, the Holstein heifer bred and owned by E. C. Schroeder, Moorehead, Minn., as a junior four-year-old, recently finished a year's test with 30,230.2 pounds of milk and 1,111 pounds of fat, equivalent to 1,389.45 pounds of 80 per cent. butter, to her credit. In no month of the year did she fall below 2,000 pounds of milk, or below 100 pounds of butter. Her average fat test for the whole year was 3.68 per cent.

According to the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, this production makes her the world's champion junior four-year-old. Besides holding the world's records for both milk and butter in her class, she is the only heifer in the world with 30,000 pounds of milk to her credit.

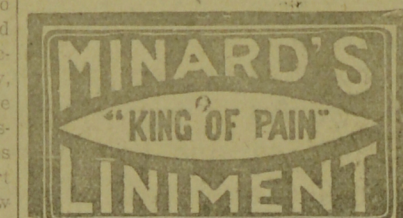

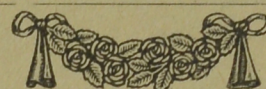

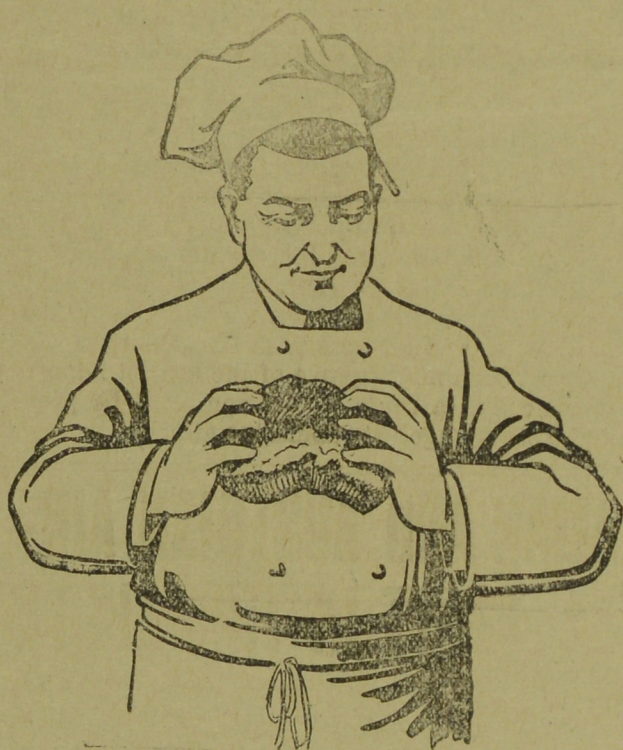
