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LANGLEY BOYS HAVE REAPPEARED AT BARKER'S POINT

Sum of Money Stolen From Mrs. George Clark's Store on Monday Last—Langleys Not About At That Time.

A robbery committed at Barker's Point on Monday last is accompanied by all the evidences which accompanied the series of thefts committed in this vicinity some months ago by a gang of juvenile thieves. The victim was Mrs. George Clarke, who conducts a small general store near the bridge across the Nashwaak.

On Monday afternoon she was working in a field near her home, leaving the house and store in charge of a young girl. The latter was working about the kitchen, and heard no person enter the store, but upon Mrs. Clarke returning to it, she found that the sum of sixteen dollars had been stolen. She is not positive about the amount, but believes that eight \$2 bills were taken. The money was kept in a cigar box, which could be reached easily by a person leaning over the counter.

It is thought the thief entering the shop unobserved, made one grab at the cash box and left with what he got, as there were several bills not taken.

Langleys Around Again.

The two Langleys, William and James, who are wanted for a variety of offences, have been seen about Barker's Point lately. William Langley, sometimes known as William Sutton, who is an absentee from the 236th Battalion, entered this store a few days before the theft and made some purchases. He gave his name as Allen and said he belonged to St. John. He

NASHWAAKSIS MAN REPORTED IN HOSPITAL WITH WOUND IN CHEST

Private Harry Delong, Late of 55th Battalion One of Recent Casualties—In France Some Time—Gunner Wade Wounded

Private Harry Delong, of Nashwaaksis, appears in the casualty list as wounded. An official telegram was received yesterday from Ottawa announcing that he had received a gunshot wound in the chest and had been admitted to hospital in England.

Private Delong enlisted here in the 55th Battalion in the spring of 1915. He was at Sussex and Valcartier with that unit during the following summer, going overseas in the autumn. Upon the 55th Battalion being broken up and drafted into units at the front, he went to France, where he has seen much service. He formerly resided in Fredericton.

Another Wounded.

Gunner Harry D. Wade, of Penniac, who left Fredericton with the 25th Field Battery under Major R. Crocker, is also reported wounded.

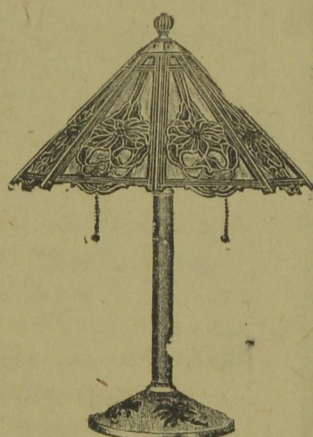
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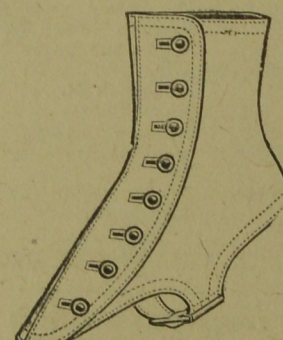
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
