WANT CLEANER POLITICS.

"I believe that we have arrived at a time when the people of Canada want cleaner politics. I have never believed it necessary to be dishonest in public life, while being honest in private life. MESSAGE TO YOUNG MEN.

"After a long life I shall remind you that already many problems rise before you; problems of race division, problems of creed differences, problems of economic conflict, problems of national duty and national aspiration. Let me tell you that for the solution of these problems you have a safe guide, an unfailing light, if you remember that faith is better than doubt, and love is better than hate.

"Banish doubt and hate from your life. Let your souls be ever open to the strong promptings of faith and the gentle influence of brotherly love. Be adamant against the haughty; be gentle and kind to the weak. Let your aim and your purpose, in good report or in ill, in victory or in defeat, be so to live, so to strive, so to serve as to do your part to raise the standard of life to higher and better spheres."—Sir Wilfrid Laurier at London, Ont.

SIR WILFRID'S JUSTIFICATION.

The Vancouver Sun of a recent date contains copies of some interesting telegrams which passed between Mr. P. C. Wade, K. C., and Sir Wilfrid Laurier regarding the latter's refusal to join the National Service Commission after Sir Thomas Tait had resigned. Mr. Wade's telegram was as follows:

Vancouver, Oct. 27.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Ottawa:

The Sun has been requested by the Vancouver Centre Liberal Association to ask you to amplify, if you think advisable, your reasons for refusing to act on the National Service Commission beyond what appears in your correspondence with Mr. Borden. Personally, as I assume that you became weary of seeing Canada's greatest, most patriotic and noblest task withheld from her people and committed to a party machine for sordid party ends. We will be glad to communicate and publish, if you desire, the fullest statement you care to make.

Sir Wilfrid replied as follows:

Ottawa, Oct. 28.

F. C. Wade, Editor of the Sun:

You have it just right. If the best man that could be found to head and direct national service found himself so much hampered and interfered with that he found his usefulness gone, my acceptance after his resignation would have amounted to countenancing a situation which has become intolerable.

This certainly puts the situation in a nutshell, says the Montreal Herald. Equally to the point is the comment of the Toronto World (Independent Conservative), which remarked:

"Those who are inclined to be critical enquire why the Opposition was asked to co-operate in this one matter and not asked to co-operate generally with the Government in the conduct of the war, and they may wonder why it is necessary to put more Conservatives than Liberals on a non-partisan committee. Eleven of the twelve district directors have been appointed. Ten of the eleven are active Conservatives. One is a Liberal."

THEIR OLD DEVICE.

The London Times military correspondent describes the process by which the German army is "expanded" to meet new emergencies, such as the expedition against Roumania. The German infantry, according to this account, has not on the whole been increased, but new forces are created by reducing the number of battalions in each division and forming new divisions out of the balance so withdrawn. By this means the reserves and young contingents are only drawn upon for the artillery personnel, the machine-gun detachments and the services of the divisions. There remains to find the guns, and these, the correspondent conjectures, are provided in part from material captured from the Allies.

Assuming this account to be accurate, we have a characteristic example of the German organization which makes a little go a long way, but there are obvious weak points in it. The

new divisions are formed by weakening the old, and though a new enterprise may for the moment have a striking success, that success must be secured by undermining the defences on other parts of the line. The Germans are, in fact, under the guise of a new organization, employing their old device of wheeling the same troops about on their interior lines to different parts of the battle ground; and if the forces opposed to them increase in men and munitions, while theirs remain stationary or decrease, each brilliant diversion must entail a corresponding penalty.

The Hearst newspapers have been excluded from Canada. The order takes effect today. Anyone in possession of such papers after that date is liable to a fine not exceeding \$5,000, or imprisonment for five years, or both. The papers banned are the New York American and Journal, the Boston American and Journal, Chicago Examiner and American, San Francisco Examiner, Los Angeles Examiner and Herald, and Atlanta Georgian and American. Following the precedent set by the British Government, the French Government has deprived Hearst and the International News Service of the use of cable service between Paris and America.

BELATED ATTEMPTS
TO DO SOMETHING

Ottawa, Nov. 10.—Stringent provisions, which are designed to regulate the cost of living and to prevent any undue or abnormal increase in the necessities of life, are contained in the order-in-council passed today by the Government with reference to this subject.

The order being based upon the War Measures Act, acquires the same force as legislation enacted by the Parliament of Canada. The Government makes certain prohibitions clearly defining what constitutes an offence in that regard, provides extensive machinery for thorough investigation and severe penalties for any person or persons or corporations who violate the provisions of the law. Wide powers are conferred upon the Minister of Labor, whose department will be the medium of action for the Government, while extensive authority is likewise given the municipalities to deal with matters which are more essentially of a local character.

FOR UNITED STATES

Washington, Nov. 10.—Secretary of State Lansing announced late today that the Austrian government has named Count De Tarnow-Tarnowski ambassador to the United States, and that he had been accepted by this government.

Records here show Count Tarnowski was secretary of the embassy here for two years. He has been in the diplomatic service since 1897, and has been attached to embassies and legations at Constantinople, Athens, Paris, Dresden, Brussels, London and Sofia.

The new ambassador is a Pole, his home being in Galicia.

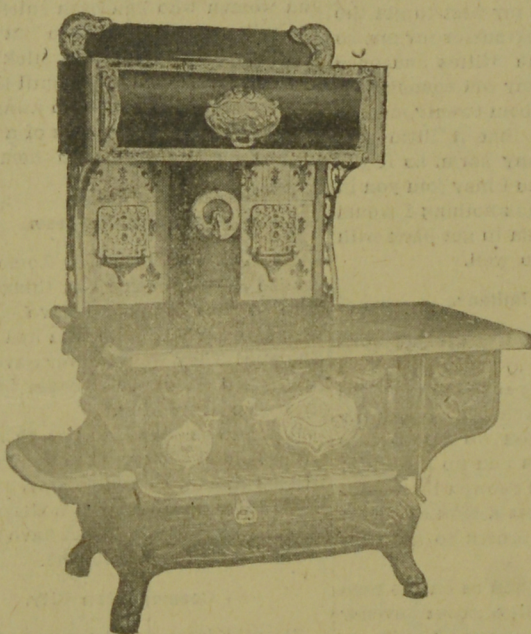
