Fresh eggs were in demand at 45c. and case eggs sold at 40c. a dozen. Chickens brought from \$1 to \$1.50, a pair, ducks 90c. each, lamb \$1 and \$1.50 per quarter, pork 13 and 14 cents a pound, beef 10 cents, turnips 90c. a barrel, carrots \$1.50 a barrel, bees honey in jars 25c., butter 35c. lb.

COUNSEL ORDERED  
REMOVED FROM COURT  
BY MAGISTRATE

Apology Made as Result--Witness For Defence in C. T. A. Case Cause of the Trouble--Case Goes Over.

There were stirring times in the police court yesterday afternoon in connection with the defended Canada Temperance Act case. Mr. R. B. Hanson disagreed with a ruling of the police magistrate and expressed his displeasure, intimating that enforcement of the act was being made more difficult by such rulings. His Honor Police Magistrate Limerick took Mr. Hanson's remarks so ill that he ordered Chief of Police Finley to remove the counsel for the prosecution from the court.

Mr. Hanson then admitted that he might have been too hasty with some of his remarks, and apologized.

The incident occurred during the hearing of a case against a local hotel at which the police secured a flask of whiskey during a raid. Mr. F. J. Hughes, counsel for the defence, had moved that the information be amended so as to apply only to the day of the raid.

His Honor granted the motion in spite of Mr. Hanson's opposition. The defence then placed on the stand an employee of the hotel, who swore that the whiskey found by the police was of a brand not sold at the hotel.

Under cross-examination by Mr. Hanson, the witness said he could not name one brand of whiskey that was sold at the hotel, and did not know what brands the hotel stocked. At this point Mr. Hughes objected to the questions

POTATO PRICES  
TOOK SHARP DROP  
HERE YESTERDAY

Upper Canadian Market Filled and Shippers are Offered More Than They Want--Lower in United States.

The potato market slumped badly yesterday and shippers are now being offered more of the tubers than they want. The cause of the slump is the filling of the Upper Canadian market. In the United States, however, though there is a similar slump, it is not as marked as in New Brunswick.

Three dollars per barrel is being paid today by local shippers and more are being offered than are wanted. This price is 25 to 50 cents per barrel lower than has been paid locally.

At Keswick, Prince William and at other points outside Fredericton, the drop in price was more marked. Yesterday the price was \$2.50 per barrel. A few days previously \$3.35 had been paid.

Turnips are being bought for seventy cents per barrel by the shippers, but the market is becoming easier all the time.

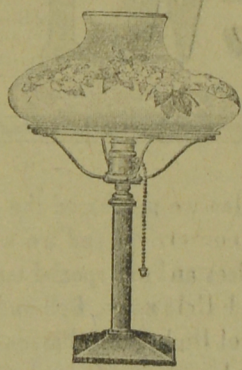

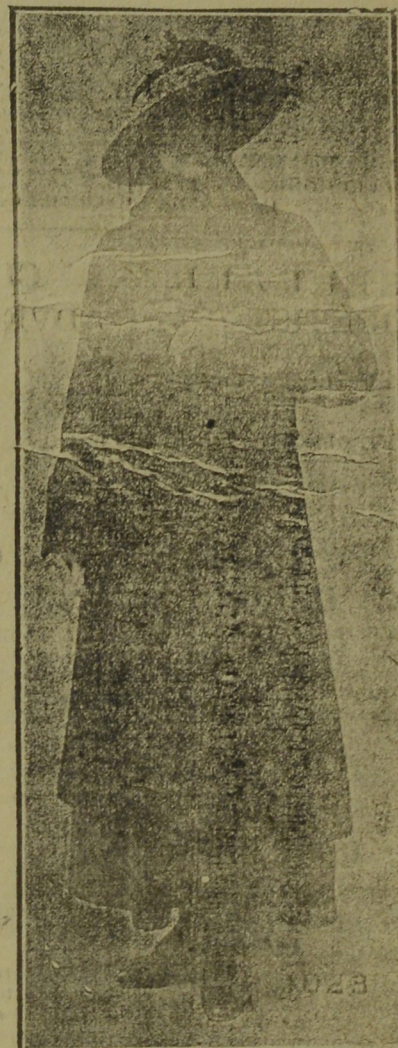

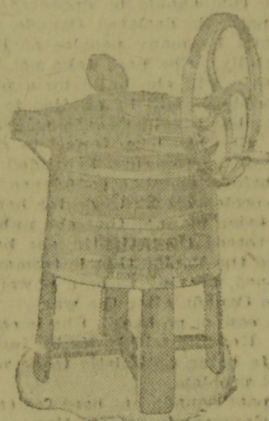
