





Fresh eggs were in demand at 45c. and case eggs sold at 40c. a dozen. Chick-ens brought from \$1 to \$1.50, a pair, ducks 90c. each, lamb \$1 and \$1.50 per quarter, pork 13 and 14 cents a pound, beef 10 cents, turnips 90c. a barrel, car rots \$1.50 a barrel, bees honey in jars .25c., butter 35c. lb.
