A VETERAN TURFMAN ATTENDED THE RACES

Mr. C. W. Bell of St. John Drove His First Race on the Fredericton Track in 1863.

Mr. Charles W. Bell, of St. John, was a conspicuous figure at the race meeting here yesterday. Indeed, a horse race without the presence of Mr. Bell in some capacity would be a decided novelty. Mr. Bell is now in his eightieth year, is remarkably well preserved, and his interest in harness racing is as keen as it ever was. He has had a successful career as a trainer and driver, and in later years has officiated in the judges' stand on nearly every Maritime track. He knows the horse racing game from A to Z.

Mr. Bell some years ago trained and drove Katrina and Archlight, the greatest performers of their day in the Maritime Provinces. Both were Maritime bred horses and their work was followed by the people with the keenest interest.

Mr. Bell, in conversation with the Mail, expressed regret that there were not more Maritime bred horses participating in race meetings at the present time. "It is the only way," he said, "to maintain public interest in the sport."

Mr. Bell drove his first race in Fredericton in 1863, on the old race course. There have been few turf events here since that time which he has missed.

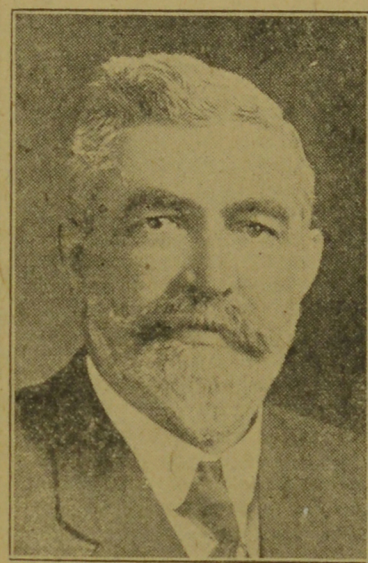

Mrs. White will be greatly missed by the younger set at Hubbards, with whom she was a general favorite.

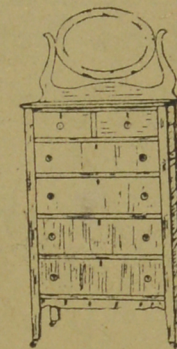
