

OVER \$30,000 SPENT ON GAME PROTECTION LAST YEAR

The Major Portion of the Money Went to Political Henchmen--Guides Complain That Game Laws Are Not Properly Enforced.

The Provincial Government last year expended on fish, forest and game protection the large sum of \$31,005.48. The amount is almost equal to the entire revenue derived from the sale of game licenses. There are many persons in a position to speak with authority who declare without hesitation that a large percentage of the money was practically thrown away. Why, it is only a few days ago that a delegation of registered guides waited upon the Acting Minister of Lands and Mines and asked for a more stringent enforcement of the game laws. They gave the acting minister to understand that a lot of game wardens drawing public money for their services are worse than useless, and that in many sections the game has no protection whatever.

The fact is that many of the wardens secure their appointments by political pull and are absolutely lacking in qualifications necessary for the proper discharge of their duties.

Under the old government there was a chief game commissioner who was paid a salary of \$600 per year. This government has a chief game warden in the person of Mr. A. E. O'Leary, who last year was paid in salary the sum of \$1,625, and in addition drew \$526.09 for travelling expenses and had an allowance of \$70.75 for a stenographer.

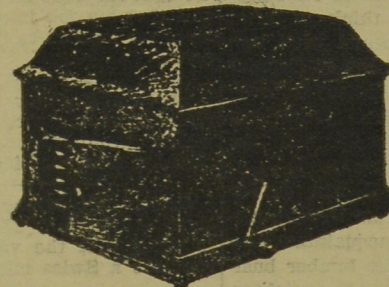

ANSWERS TO ENQUIRIES IN THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE

Hon. Mr. Murray, in reply to Mr. Dugal's inquiry in the House, said: 1. What information has the government with regard to the Canada Iron Corporation (in liquidation), which company are the guarantors of the Northern N.B. and Seaboard Railway Company bonds?

Ans. The Canada Iron Corporation commenced operations in New Brunswick in 1909 and made the first shipment of iron ore in the fall of 1910 and continued operations during 1911, 1912 and 1913. All the ore was shipped to Philadelphia with the exception of one cargo shipped during the autumn of 1913 to Sydney, Cape Breton. During this period 163,899 net tons were mined and shipped. In the development of the mine and the installation of necessary plant, it is stated that the corporation spent \$300,000. The total investment of the corporation in the Province of New Brunswick to open up the iron ore industry, including the building of the Northern N.B. and Seaboard Railway and the New Brunswick docks and terminals at Newcastle, is \$1,188,000. It is believed by the liquidators of the corporation that under normal conditions the Bathurst mines can be re-opened and operated successfully. For some time past efforts have been made to enlist the co-operation of large users of ore but because of the various difficulties including lack of transportation, the work has been at a standstill. The government is advised that as late as November 1915, negotiations were in progress looking toward the renewed operations of the mine but on account of the continuance of the war and of the lack of transportation, nothing as yet has been accomplished to this end. Within a very short

time the interests of the Canada Iron Corporation in liquidation have been transferred to the Canada Iron Foundries Limited, which corporation the government is assured intends to resume operations at the mines as soon as provision for transportation can be made.

2. When was the interest on these bonds due and is there any interest unpaid?

Ans. The first interest on these bonds became due and payable on the 1st July, 1910, and the interest is payable on the 1st days of January and July in each year. The government is not aware that any interest on these bonds has not been paid not having been called upon to pay the same.

3. What propositions have been made to the government with respect to the reopening of the Gloucester iron mines and from whom did these propositions come and what was the nature of them?

Ans. No such propositions have been recently made to the government other than those contained in the answer to Question 1.

4. Has any of the rolling stock of the railway been sold and to whom and for what amount and was the government consulted and does not the mortgage held by the government cover rolling stock as well as railway?

(Ans. The government has no information of any sale of rolling stock of the railway. The government holds a mortgage covering all rights in the railway, including rolling stock, which mortgage is regularly on file in the Gloucester County Record Office.
