## HOSPITAL BOARD EXPRESSES AP- PRECIATION OF THE FRASER GIFT

Committee Composed of President VanDine and Dr. Holden Appointed to Act With Mr. Archibald Fraser--New Wing to be Completed this Season.

A special meeting of the Trustees of Victoria Public Hospital was held yesterday in the office of the Mayor, with President VanDine in the chair. The other members in attendance were Vice-President Gregory, Dr. Holden, His Worship the Mayor, Coun. Smith, Hon. Judge Crocket, G. N. C. Hawkins, P. J. Hughes and H. G. Kitchen.

The president explained that meeting was called to consider a letter he had received from Mr. Archibald Fraser, having reference to one of the several plans made by his father, Donald Fraser, previous to his decease. The letter follows:

Dear Mr. VanDine:—I beg to advise you that my late father, before his death, requested my brother and myself, in the event of his death, to undertake the construction and erection of a new wing to Victoria Hospital and complete the same along lines indicated by him to me, provided, of course, the gift is acceptable to the Trustees.

My idea is that the arrangement should be left wholly in the hands of a small committee, consisting of two members of your board and myself, and that the joint action of this committee should govern. I think you will agree that a small committee is preferable to a large committee and I trust this view will meet with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

I shall be glad if you will arrange to bring the matter before the Trustees, at an early date, and advise me of their attitude. If favorable, I shall be glad to meet your board or

a sub-committee thereof, to discuss the whole matter, as it is the desire of my brother and myself to have the structure completed this season.

After a general conversation respecting the magnificent provision made for the greatly needed enlargement of the hospital by the late Mr. Fraser, in addition to previous gifts, the following resolution, presented by Vice-President Gregory and seconded by Hon. Judge Crocket, was passed unanimously:

Resolved, That the great appreciation of the Board of Trustees of the very generous gift of the late Mr. Fraser, as proposed in the letter of Mr. Archibald Fraser, addressed to the president under date April 8th inst., be recorded, and that in pursuance of Mr. Fraser's suggestion a committee of the board consisting of two members, be appointed to act in conjunction with him in the carrying out of the wishes of the late Mr. Donald Fraser in respect to the said gift.

Further resolved, That the secretary-treasurer be instructed to forward to Mr. Archibald Fraser a copy of the preceding resolution, together with the names of the committee appointed by the board.

Subsequently, in accord with Mr. Fraser's suggestion, the board appointed Mr. R. B. VanDine president, and Dr. C. P. Holden, medical trustee, a committee to act with Mr. Fraser.

The intention is to confine membership to those who have seen active service and to ask returned soldiers in neighboring towns to co-operate by the formation of similar branches. The organization meeting was held at the Education Office in the guard-room used by the returned soldiers, who are employed as guards at the Parliament Buildings, with Private James Jones in the chair. Those present were A. McWha, A. F. Blizard, James Jones, Ernest Fenety, J. Ellick, John Janus, John Ryder, John Watson, John Mackay, James King, George MacDonald.

### Resolutions Passed.

The following resolutions were passed:

That the Association be called The European War Veterans' Association of Canada.

That other towns of the province be communicated with in regard to organization and that they become affiliated with the Fredericton Association.

That the Association get in touch with the representatives of the different districts at Ottawa and endeavor to have them use their influence in obtaining positions for the returned soldiers.

That the Association apply to the government for a charter for the organization.

That George MacDonald be appointed treasurer of the Association.

That the first Sunday after the twenty-second of May each year be kept as a day of decoration for the boys who fell in the battle of Festubert.

That Fred Phillips, son of the late Robert Phillips, who fell at Hill 60 while fighting with the Dorset Regiment, be an honorary member of the Association.

That President James Jones, Vice-President A. McWha and Secretary Ernest Fenety interview Mayor Mitchell to arrange that April 22 of each year be recognized as a day of memoriam for the Canadians who fell at the battles of Ypres, St. Julien and Langemarck, flags being flown at half mast.
