## MOVEMENTS OF BAPTIST MINISTERS

(Maritime Baptist.)

In the church report from Hillsboro, it will be noted that Rev. W. W. Schurman, the pastor, received a call from the Bethany church at Sydney. It ought to be added that the call was not accepted, the Hillsboro church persuading their pastor to remain with them.

Rev. A. J. McLeod, whose labors as an evangelist has been greatly blessed in many of our churches, spent some weeks in April with Pastor DeWolfe, at Albert, N.B. A gracious revival was experienced. Thirty three candidates were baptized and received into the church. Mr. McLeod is now assisting Pastor Wetmore at Waterside.

Rev. Josiah Webb, veteran pastor at Kemptville, N.S., has apparently never heard of the "dead line" or at least has never had any acquaintance with it. He is in his sixty-eighth year, yet every alternate Sunday he preaches three times and drives over twenty miles. Revival services are now being held with an encouraging result.

A card from Rev. J. B. Ganong contains the cheering intelligence that he is making good progress toward recovery. He is now able to walk about with but little discomfort and is hopeful that the treatment he is receiving at Clifton Springs may eradicate the trouble. While granted leave of absence, he still keeps in touch with the home mission work by correspondence.

Rev. C. K. Harrington expects to leave Tokio, Japan, by the Empress of Russia for Vancouver on May 25. He is a son of the late C. H. Harrington of Sydney, and is an honored missionary in Japan under the A. B. M. U. During his furlough he will make his headquarters at Kentville, N.S.

The Victoria street church, St. John, recently voted its pastor, Rev. B. H. Nobles, leave of absence until September 1. Pastor Nobles is making a slow recovery from the severe attack of heart trouble which prostrated him some weeks ago. He will spend the summer at his cottage in Grand Bay.

Capt. Eric Macdonald, "somewhere in France," received the honor of mention in "despatches" last week. Under cover of darkness he advanced to a point which the Germans would soon occupy and there planted a trap for the oncoming. It was a good trap, too, though not in the estimation of the few Germans who escaped it. Thus it would seem that the Huns are sometimes "hoist" by their own petard," so to speak.

One marriage notice published in this issue is of unusual interest. Miss Mould rendered valuable service as a missionary under our board during her stay in India. Since returning she has become personally known to many through her deputation work. For two years she has been prepared to return to the work in India, but her health would not permit. We wish her all joy and much service in the new experience of life upon which she has entered.

In a letter received by a friend from Miss Helena Blackadar, Waltham, India, dated March 24, like all the British people, she speaks of the war "we are waging for God and truth," and adds: "I knit as I go to and fro to town every day and am now on my sixth pair of socks. Some times I want to go to the front to help."

We have received from Rev. H. G. Estabrook of Summerland, B.C., a letter of appreciation concerning Rev. D. E. Hatt and his work as poet and reader. Mr. Hatt needs no introduction or commendation in these provinces. When he turns his steps eastward he is coming home and he has not been gone so long that we have forgotten him.

Rev. C. K. Morse, who sailed as a private in the 61st Battalion from Halifax on April 5, was called upon on Sunday, April 9, to conduct worship twice on board the Olympic. Two of the regular chaplains were sick. Private Morse, therefore, spoke to his own battalion at nine a.m. and to about five hundred nurses and ambulance corpsmen and officers at eleven a.m. The band of the 61st Battalion led the music for the services. Private Morse reports a delightful trip across the Atlantic, reaching Liverpool on April 15. The Olympic carried nearly seven thousand men, including crew. The 61st Battalion is stationed at Camp Borden, Hampshire, England.

The battalion probably will leave for England some time in July.

### PLICE COURT NOTES.

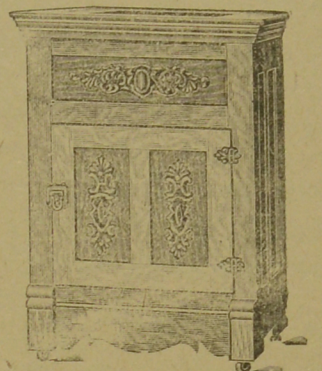

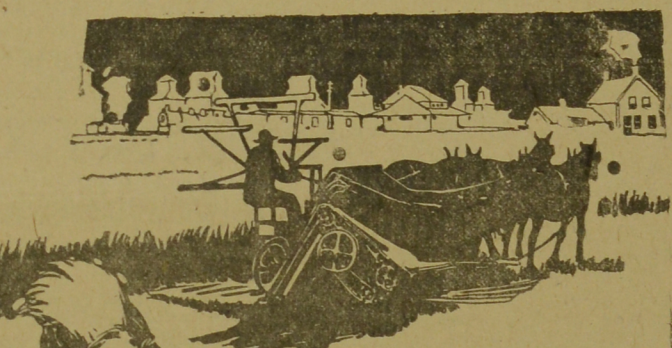

### WOMAN SHOT HER

### GAMBLER HUSBAND

Bridgeport, Conn., May 11.—Nicholas Papp was shot and killed by his young wife at a local factory today, in the presence of a number of his fellow workmen.

Mrs. Papp then attempted to take her own life, but spectators snatched the revolver from her and she was turned over to the police.

The shooting occurred, it is said, after Papp had refused his wife's appeals to give up his alleged gambling associates.
