LOVING CUP PRESENTED
TO SPEAKER AT BOSTONFormer Red Sox Who is Now With Cleveland Given
Rousing Greeting by Fans of The Hub—Played in
Great Form for the Indians.

Boston, May 10—There were 14,353 persons at Fenway Park yesterday who will agree that "Speaker Day" was a huge success and while they rose and sang "Auld Lang Syne," cheered for "Spoke" and wished him all sorts of success, they were hoping that the Red Sox would land a victory, and when this was accomplished, they went home happy.

It surely did seem strange to see "Spoke" out on the green in the Cleveland spangles. It seemed like a dream, but when he wacked that triple down to the flag pole those folks who thought it was only a dream came to their feet with a lot of "peg" and watched the progress of the ball as it was relayed. Walker to Hooper to Carrigan. "Spoke" never attempted to make a circuit out of the drive, but he might have got away with it had not he pulled up at third.

The city will have always many fond memories of the Texan and yesterday the moment he arrived at the Back Bay station, which was less than four hours before the game, he deserted his brother Indians and looked up his old comrades, his Red Sox pals at "Pats," and Capt. "Tom" Goode and other police friends at the Boylston street station.

Shortly after two o'clock, when Tris came on the field, after a lot of hard-baking in the Red Sox dugout, he was given a grand ovation by several thousand "early birds" in the stand and bleachers and when he raced out to his old stamping ground in centre field for fielding practise, the crowd, which had grown considerably larger, again showed him the esteem in which they held him.

Gifts From Shriners.

Before and after the fielding practise, when he was mingling with the other members of the Indians about their dugout, he could not be distinguished by some of the fans and a lot of them could be heard saying: "Where is he? Yes, that's the old bearcat sure enough."

Just before the game started the band struck up "Auld Lang Syne" and a committee of Shriners, a large number of whom attended the game, approached the plate and Walter W. Morrison, Potentate of Aleppo Temple, presented Tris a Shriners' e-

blem and a fez, the great outfielder wearing the fez while the photographers snapped the group.

Frank H. Appleton and Jacob C. Morse were the other members of the committee and Mr. Morse said later that "Spoke" is going to be in on some of the good things that his brother Shriners are arranging.

NEW WORLD'S RECORD FOR
120-YARD HURDLE RACE

Columbus, Mo., May 9—Robert Simpson, the Missouri University star, established a new world's record of 14.45 seconds in the 123-yard hurdle event, at the annual Missouri Iowa State College dual meet here Saturday. This erased one-fifth of a second from the mark, which was jointly held by five runners along with Simpson. The Missouri athlete gathered twenty points for his team, which was an easy winner by eighty points to forty-seven.

SAM CRAWFORD
SHOWS UP AND WILL
BE SENT TO BENCHHugh Jennings Says there
is Nothing Else to do--
He Will be Used as
a Pinch Hitter

Philadelphia, May 9—Manager Jennings announced today that as soon as Veach is able to return to the game, he intends to bench Sam Crawford, the Detroit veteran right fielder.

"I have just about made up my mind to shift Hellman to right field and use George Burns as our regular first baseman," said Hughes. "Sam has not been hitting so form and I am afraid he has finished his career as a regular."

The Tiger manager says that Crawford has showed up so much that he no longer is a help to the club as a fielder and that he intends to employ him hereafter mainly as a pinch hitter. The plan is to use Harper in right field against right hand pitchers and Hellman when a southpaw is on duty.

Crawford has been unable to get going at bat this season and Jennings wants a faster man in the field while he is not receiving the aid of the clugging for which Sam is noted.

Crawford has been with the Tigers fourteen years and is beloved by the Detroit fans as one of the game's leanest characters.

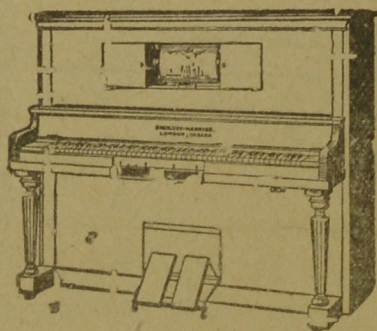
