C.P.R. TRAIN CHANGES.

Effective May 22nd, the C.P.R. will discontinue the early morning St. John connection out of Fredericton, and instead train will leave Fredericton at 7.20 a.m., Atlantic, arriving at Fredericton Junction 8.05 a.m., and make close connection with the early morning Boston express from St. John.

ST. JOHN & QUEBEC DIRECTORS.

The directors of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company met last night at the company's offices in the city and considered a number of claims in regard to right-of-way. Up to noon today no award of contract had been made for the construction of the Gagetown-Westfield section. The directors meet this afternoon and evening.

Havelock Kelley of Stanley Enlisted This Morning--Capt. A. L. McDougall of Ottawa Here After Recruits For Battalion

Havelock Kelly of Stanley, enlisted here this morning for the 4th Pioneer Battalion. Pioneer Kelly has a son at the front, Private Allan Kelley, who left with the first draft from the 71st York Regt. in August, 1914. Lieut. A. C. Kelley, who left at the same time and is also at the front, is a nephew. Other men who had enlisted here previously for the 4th Pioneer Battalion are James Foster and Charles L. Dupuis, the latter a former member of the Royal Canadian Regiment. Pioneer Kelley is well known to the public, having conducted a hotel at Stanley for some years. He is an ex-county councillor.

After Recruits.

Capt. A. L. McDougall of Ottawa, is in the city today after recruits for the 4th Pioneer Battalion. Capt. McDougall is a cousin of Lieut. Col. McDougall of Ottawa, who is officer commanding the 224th Forestry Battalion, which recruited a large number of men from Fredericton and the vicinity. Capt. McDougall says that the class of men wanted as recruits are teamsters, choppers, bridgemen, construction men, blacksmiths, etc. The battalion also wants bandsmen, as Bate & McMahon of Ottawa, a prominent firm of contractors, have presented the 4th Pioneer Battalion with instruments for a complete

VICTORIA HOSPITAL

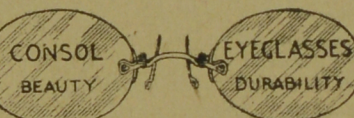
His Instruments Thought Best in Province, Also Magnificent Medical Library--Contracts For Year Are Awarded.

At the last meeting of the Victoria Hospital Board, at the suggestion of Mr. Archibald Fraser, Mr. Hamilton G. Kitchen was added to the Building Committee. It was proposed to have the new building erected on the upper side of the present hospital property and directly in front of the Dow Wing. Of course this would necessitate the removal of the wing to the rear. A delegation was appointed to wait upon the government with the view of procuring the vacant lot above the present property in order to have room for the proposed Fraser extension. No reply has yet been received. A special hospital architect, Mr. Ray of Montreal, has been here and under Mr. Fraser's direction, will shortly have plans ready for a modern building, lacking no accommodation for the comfort of patients.

Many Donations.

At this meeting Miss Murray, the superintendent, reported the treatment of fifty-five patients during the month and that a good variety of donations reached the hospital. These included a supply of fresh eggs and fruit for ward patients from Miss Stella Sherman; flowers from the Fredericton Brass Band; a variety of fruit from Mr. Wm. A. Perkins; a generous supply of fresh eggs for the nurses from Mr. Edward Moore; most acceptable donation of night

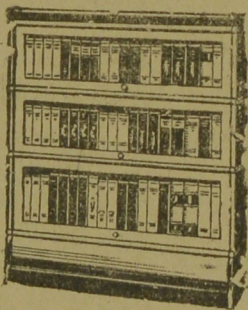

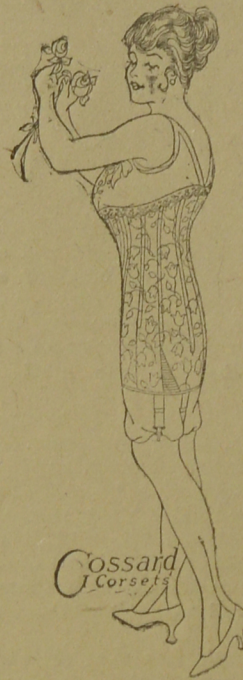

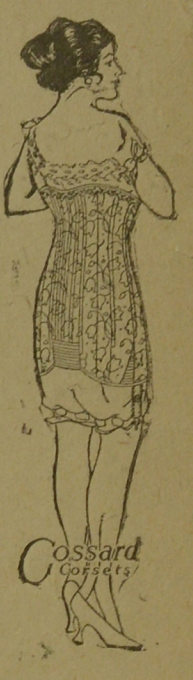
