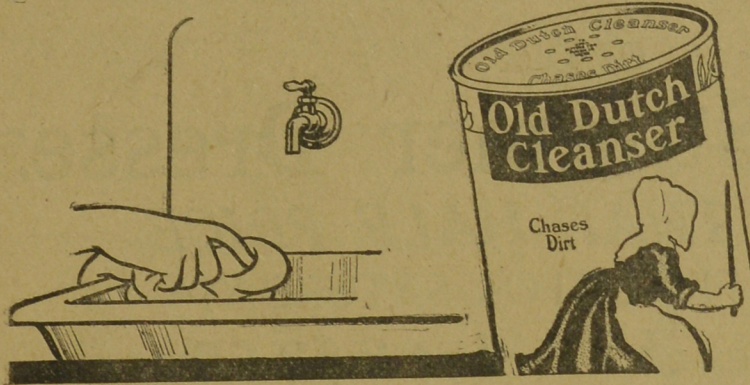

STALLINGS READY FOR BIG TRADE

Chicago, Aug. 23.—Four members of the Boston National League club are likely to don Chicago uniforms and Heinie Zimmerman, the Chicago infielder, is expected to join the Braves before the end of the present week.

A series is scheduled to start between the clubs tomorrow and Manager Stallings probably will play J. Carlisle Smith, third baseman; Edward Fitzpatrick, second baseman; Edgar Collins, outfielder, and Jess Barnes, pitcher, in order that the Chicago authorities may size up their worth.

Stallings believes that Zimmerman ranks next to Cobb as the greatest player in the major league ranks and he is eager to secure the third baseman to play at the right of Rabbit Maranville.

Although there have been rumors that either Evers or Maranville will figure in the deal, this has been officially denied.

It was learned from a reliable source that the present proposition was made by Manager Stallings and differs slightly from a trade that was proposed earlier.

CANADIAN SOLDIERS SICK OF HUGHES

Four Out
Of Every Five Would Vote
Liberal.

(Toronto Globe.)

"If a Canadian general election came along tomorrow and a vote of the Canadian soldiers in Britain and at the front were taken I am safe in saying that four out of every five soldiers would vote for the Liberal party. I have met a great many of these boys, and, make no mistake, they express their mind freely. The war mismanagement in Canada has made a profound impression, and the soldiers are sick of Sam Hughes and the ministry with which he is associated."

So spoke "Fighting Joe" Martin, M. P. for East St. Pancras, London, in the British House of Commons, who was in Toronto yesterday.

Mr. Martin vigorously arraigned the Canadian correspondence to the London Times as partisan and unreliable. The correspondent is careful to see that nothing against the interests of the Canadian Conservative party is ever published," said he, "and the majority of the despatches which have appeared are not fair samples of what has been going on here."

Mr. Martin gave as an illustration the disclosures and investigations in which Sir Sam Hughes and his friend Allison were concerned. "But, believe me," he added, "the Canadian soldiers know what has been happening and they have no love for the Minister of Militia."

Love of Glorification.

Mr. Martin sharply criticized the selfish love of glorification and display which has characterized the Borden Minister. Soldiers at Camp Borden, in Canada, he says, were not the only ones who suffered.

"Just before I left the old land," said Mr. Martin, "Sir Sam arrived in England, and though many of the men at Bramshott Camp were on their last leave in London, they were immediately called back to camp for a ceremonial inspection. The men were nearly riotous and those I spoke to were very bitter, feeling that it was nothing else but a big scheme for publicity for Sir Sam."

Mr. Martin declared that the belief was general that the Borden administration under existing conditions could not survive a general election when that takes place in Canada. He hinted that he might abandon his seat in the British House and contest a British Columbia constituency in Canada.

HEADQUARTERS AT ST. JOHN.

242nd Forestry Battalion Will be Quartered in Exhibition Building.

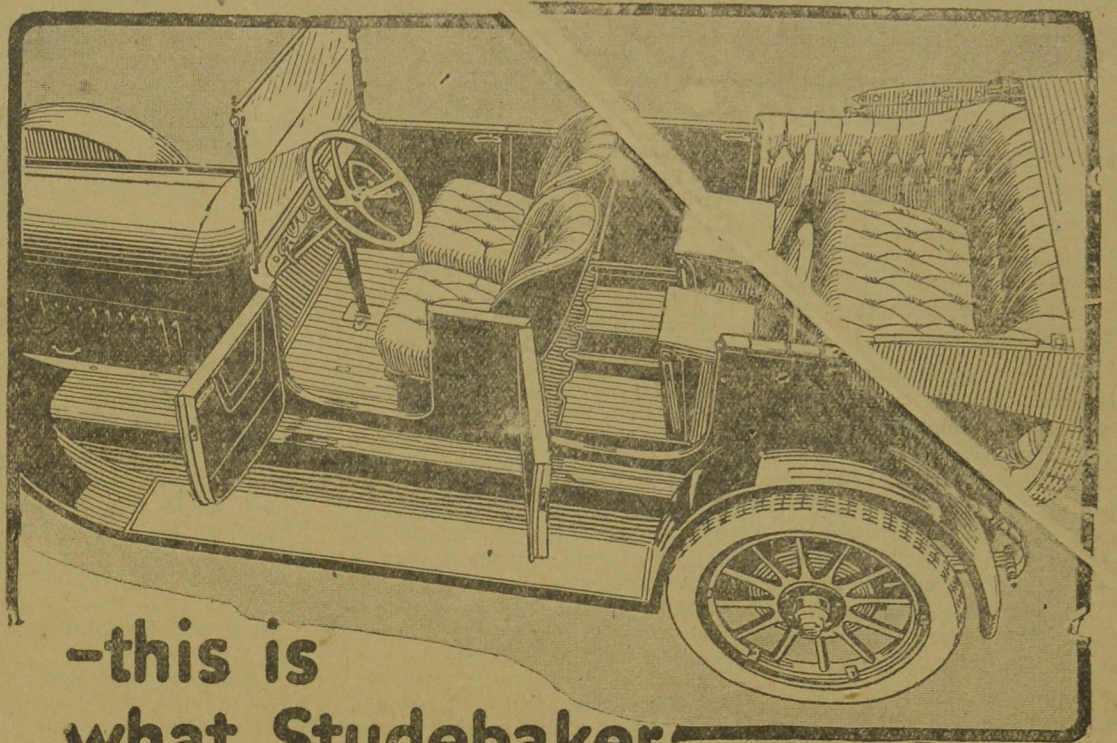
St. John is to be the headquarters in the Maritime Provinces for 242nd Forestry Battalion, and the members of the unit are to be quartered in the exhibition building.

This battalion was authorized in the latter part of June, and just recently the authorization for recruiting was received.

It is expected that the unit will fill up very rapidly, as the medical standard is low, the age limit is higher, being forty-eight, and so long as a man has not lost a thumb or big toe and has some conception of the following occupations, he is eligible to become a member of the unit: Woods and mill foremen, choppers, engineers, chauffeurs, cooks, saw filers and other various lines of trades pertaining to lumbering.

Only two companies are to be recruited in eastern Canada, one in Nova Scotia, and the other in New Brunswick, each company to have a strength of 250.
