JAMES D. MacKAY DIED SUDDENLY ON SUNDAY

Well Known Resident of City--Native of Boiestown--Funeral Tuesday.

James D. MacKay died very suddenly last night at his residence, 492 George street. He had been to church in the morning and was about the house during the day. In the evening he was sitting on the verandah. Death occurred shortly after 9 o'clock.

The deceased was well known about the city, and there is much sympathy for the bereaved family. He was born at Boiestown, Northumberland county, August 26, 1835, being the only son of the late William MacKay, of that place.

In 1873 he removed to Chatham, where he resided until 1888. While a resident of Chatham he held important positions with the lumber firms of J. B. Snowball and R. A. & J. Stewart.

Since 1888 he had been a resident of Fredericton except for a period of about three years during which he was manager of the Davidson lumber business at Salmon River, St. John county.

In Fredericton he established the boot and shoe business still conducted under the name of MacKay & Co. He represented St. Ann's ward in the City Council for some years, and later became city auditor, holding the office for several years. He also was fisheries officer for York county, resigning the office about three years ago on account of failing strength.

Prior to coming to Fredericton to reside, he had represented the Parish of Stanley in the York County Council. He was the first representative from the Miramichi end of the parish.

The deceased was a prominent member of St. Paul's Presbyterian church, and a regular attendant at its services. He also was a member of St. Andrew's Society in this city. He was past president of this organization and one of its oldest members. He also was a Mason for years, being a member of Miramichi Lodge.

The late Mr. MacKay is survived by a widow, formerly Miss Annie MacMillan, daughter of the late Miles MacMillan, of Boiestown.

Three sons and one daughter also survive. They are William D., of Truro, N.S., Ernest A., deputy clerk of pleas, of this city, J. Walter, who conducts the business of MacKay & Co., in this city, and Mrs. William Walker, also of Fredericton.

The funeral will take place from his late residence on Tuesday afternoon. Service will be conducted at the house at 3 o'clock by Rev. J. H. A. Anderson. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery. The funeral will be under Masonic auspices.

ATHENS, Greece, July 3, via London.—The blockade of Greece, which was instituted by the Entente Allies before Greece yielded to their demands for demobilization and other changes in her policy, has been officially raised. Bread riots on the island of Mitylene were reported today.

According to the St. John Globe, Company Sergt. Major F. L. Mooers and Orderly Room Sergt. H. LeRoit Mooers, of this city, who belong to the 236th Highlanders, are to take clerkships in New Brunswick district office at St. John.

Had Rough Trip.

Mr. Henry Braithwaite, the veteran guide and trapper, returned on Saturday from a six weeks' trip to the Miramichi woods. He reports bears very plentiful and trapped a large number. He also secured two cubs and has them in captivity. Mr. Braithwaite and his companion, Mr. Manford Yeomans, of Barker's Point, made the trip home by canoe. They came down Rocky Brook and followed the Southwest Miramichi to Boiestown. Mr. Braithwaite says it rained steadily for fifteen days in the Miramichi woods.

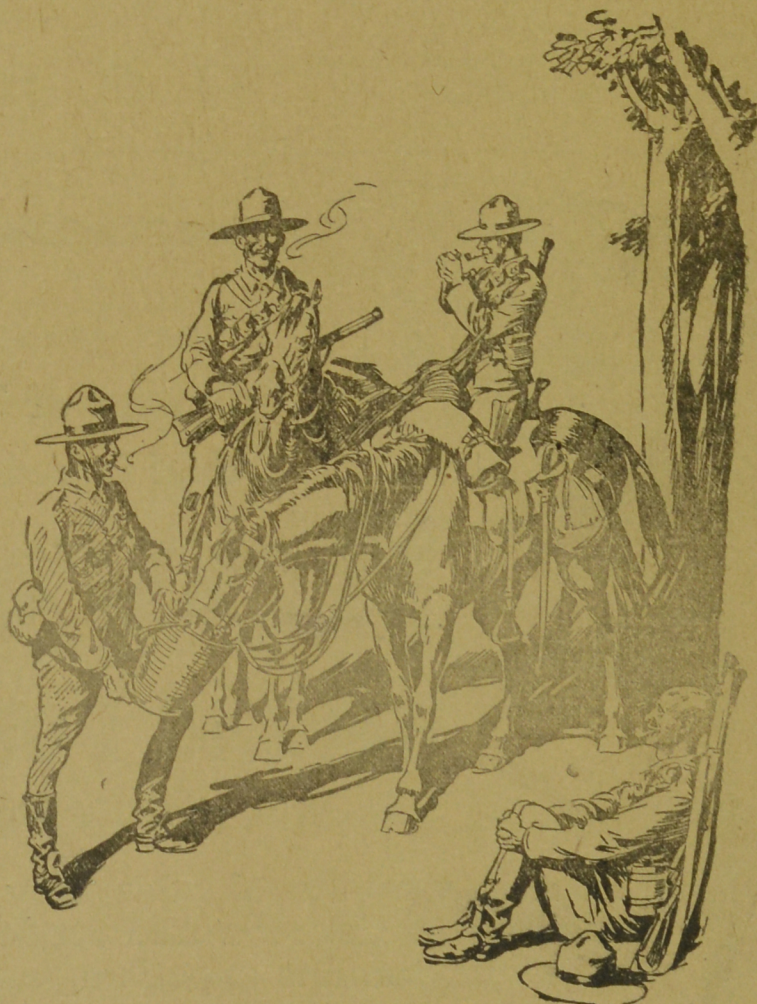
