ELABORATE PREPARATIONS MADE FOR BIG OFFENSIVE

British Build up a Vast Organization Before Going After the Huns in Earnest—Big Stock of Ammunition Laid in, Hospitals Equipped and Enclosures Prepared for the Reception of Prisoners.

On the British Southern Front, July 31.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) One of the most striking features of the great British drive north of the Somme was the extraordinarily thorough preparation before the offensive was begun.

Long before the attack was launched the British staff was busy building up a vast organization which should be complete to the most minute detail. Military experts declare that the degree of preparedness achieved was unprecedented. Seemingly nothing that could be done was left undone, and when a representative of the Associated Press visited this section of the British front to see the captured territory had watch the assault proceed, the various activities were being conducted with such co-ordination that they appeared to be done by clock work.

The collection of huge stores of ammunition, the assembling of the stores and supplies were but one phase of the preparation. Bases for various supplies were prepared, where they would be most easily accessible when the advance began.

Emergency hospitals were constructed and enclosures were built for the reception of prisoners. Great numbers of extra motor lorries were provided for transport work over roads which were continually being improved by the myriads of workmen, and Red Cross motor ambulances were made ready for the speedy handling of large numbers of wounded, both British and German.

Plans Carefully Laid.

"But it was not only for work in the British-occupied territory that plans were laid. Provision must be made for the troops when once they had forced their way into Germany ground. The royal engineers worked out an elaborate scheme whereby water for the use of the men should follow them into the German trenches all along the line."

It is not permitted to say how this was accomplished, but it is said that it has been done successfully.

"Our emplacements back of the German front lines were worked out in advance, and routes of least resistance for reaching these points were decided upon. Plans for the consolidation of captured territory were elaborately considered and provision was made for the immediate clearing away of the great quantity of debris of every description that always strews a battle field."

In fact, every scheme possible was applied in order that there should be no loss of time or energy when once the offensive had begun.

Intense Activity.

"Now that the attack is under way there is intense but methodical activity for miles behind this part of the front. Motor lorries flow in steady streams back and forth along the road, bringing supplies to the front. The wounded are being moved swiftly, but with great care to the base hospital many miles away, after treatment in the emergency stations. And all along the line scores of thousands of soldiers are busy handling supplies, making provision for calls from the extreme front, and clearing and consolidating the ground taken."

THE TROUBLES OF GREECE.

They are Just Beginning, is the Opinion of a Correspondent.

Athens, July 29 (correspondence).—

"The trouble in Greece is just beginning," is the opinion of a neutral diplomatist here. "King Constantine cannot logically accept the result of the coming elections calmly, for they seem almost certain to mean the return of Venizelos to power; and Venizelos is determined at any cost to make it impossible for a Greek Sovereign ever again to seize the reins of power as Constantine has done. But I believe Constantine will actually abdicate before he will consent to surrender any part of his prerogative."

"Still worse, from the King's point of view, is that Venizelos returning to power is expected to bring Greece into the European war on the side of the Allies. They say that Venizelos and his followers are already placing orders for munitions and armament for the Greek army in that event."

"Can anyone see Constantine leading his men against the forces of his brother-in-law, the Kaiser, while Venizelos, whom he regards as his arch-enemy, governs the country in the royal name?"

Public Schools Notice.

FOR the special benefit of pupils who have reached Grade VI and who are unable to continue the common school course, the Trustees will open a pre-vocational department in the York Street School building. Applicants for admission to this department will file their names with the Secretary and obtain an admission certificate.

In accordance with the Compulsory Schools Act, all children from six to fourteen years of age must be in attendance at school. In every case the reason for non-attendance must be given to the Board of School Trustees by the parent or guardian of the child.

In pursuance of Sec. 73 of the Schools Act, the Secretary is required in every case to demand a physicians' certificate or other evidence of recent successful vaccination before a permit may be issued.

All the schools will be re-opened on Monday, 25th inst., at 9 o'clock, a.m., and permits may be obtained at the office on York street during the previous week. Applicants for admission to the Model School, whose names have been registered, will apply for permits on Friday, 25th inst.
